Regrettably however, almost one year after the signing of the Aaron Cohen Law, another cyclists' life was abruptly ended on the Rickenbacker Causeway. The death of Walter Reyes now grimly represents a total of 4 cycling deaths on this vital waterfront transportation and recreation corridor in less than a decade.

By connecting Plan Z to the East Coast Greenway we establish a safe and highly desirable trail for cyclist, runners, hikers, walkers and others who simply want to experience the best views and beaches along Biscayne bay and Miami's skyline. 

We founded SAFE in 2000 in Delray Beach, FL and has a long-term goal of encouraging communities to be more pedestrian and bicycle friendly. SAFE's members meet with local government leaders and other community organizations to encourage the design and construction of "complete streets", pedestrian walkways and cycling facilities. SAFE also encourages communities to design and fund greenways and trails for community enjoyment.

SAFE is currently working with the City of Delray Beach, Florida to designate approximately 6.3 miles of SR A1A, George Bush Boulevard and North/South Federal Highways as an East Coast Greenway. In December 2015, the City Commission of Delray Beach approved a city resolution to approve and name this trail.

Our organization, <u>Plan Z for Miami</u>, is a grassroots led effort that aims to restore safety and vitality back to the most utilized segment of road in the state of Florida for cycling and running; Miami Dade County's Rickenbacker Causeway.

Regrettably however, almost one year after the signing of the Aaron Cohen Law, another cyclists' life was abruptly ended on the Rickenbacker Causeway. The death of Walter Reyes now grimly represents a total of 4 cycling deaths on this vital waterfront transportation and recreation corridor in less than a decade.

By connecting Plan Z to the East Coast Greenway we establish a safe and highly desirable trail for cyclist, runners, hikers, walkers and others who simply want to experience the best views and beaches along Biscayne bay and Miami's skyline. This particular area encompasses and connects some of Miami's most beautiful parks and beaches on Biscayne Bay and provides for everything from coastal ecological zones to water sports of all kinds, from a historic marine stadium, seaquarium to mountain bike trails, from nationally recognized academic institutions like MDCPS's Mast Academy and University of Miami Rosentiel Medical Science Building to the Marjorie Stoneman Douglas Nature Center. There is not a better location for both domestic and international tourism than this for the east coast greenway participant. It will be a prime destination for the day trip cyclists as well as road adventurers as they embark on the east coast greenway.

The East Coast Greenway Alliance is impressed by Florida's commitment to becoming a national leader in trail development. The SUN Trail program — Shared-Use Nonmotorized (SUN) Trail, as authorized by the 2014 Trail Legislation: 335.065(4), FS — brings resources forward that match the high ambition of Florida DEP's Office of Greenways & Trails and Florida DOT. As the organization leading the development of the nation's longest urban trail, we feel a strong alignment with your efforts.

We see a special opportunity in southeastern Florida and support the selection of the East Coast Greenway Southeast Region as a six-county region ripe for trail development which would benefit the maximum number of Floridians. The counties are Indian River, St. Lucie, Martin, Palm Beach, Broward, and Miami-Dade.

The East Coast Greenway is a 2,900-mile multi-use trail linking 15 states and 450 communities from Calais, Maine, to Key West, Florida. STATEMENT OF INTENT FOR ENTRY INTO AGREEMENT FOR CONSTRUCTION, MANAGEMENT AND MAINTENANCE OF THE UNDERLINE

BETWEEN

MIAMI-DADE COUNTY PARKS, TRANSIT, FRIENDS OF THE UNDERLINE, INC., AND A CONTEMPLATED NOT-FOR-PROFIT MANAGEMENT ORGANIZATION

JANUARY 9, 2016

Miami-Dade County's Parks, Recreation and Open Spaces Department ("PROS") and Miami-Dade Transit ("MDT") agree to work together to cause the redevelopment of the underutilized land below Miami's Metrorail, from the Miami River to Dadeland South Station ("The Underline"), into an iconic linear park, world-class urban trail and living art destination to connect communities, improve pedestrian and bicyclist safety, create over a hundred acres of open space with restored natural habitats, encourage a healthy lifestyle, provide an easily accessible place to exercise, create a mobility corridor that integrates transit, car, biking and walking, provide a 10-mile canvas for artistic expression, increase transit ridership, reduce traffic from motorized vehicles, attract development along US1, and generate significant positive jobs and other economic impact to the County.

Both Parties have already worked extensively with Friends of the Underline ("Friends" and together with PROS and MDT, the "Parties"), a Florida non-profit corporation qualified under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, and agree that they shall facilitate the construction, management and maintenance of The Underline with the assistance of Friends. Further, Parties contemplate the formation of a separate non-profit "Management Organization" qualified under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code with broad public representation that will oversee the management of the public space in a strategic venture with PROS and MDT.

While the Parties recognize that none of the matters herein are legally binding or enforceable until a final Management Agreement is reached, this Statement of Intent outlines the factual acknowledgements and roles and responsibilities that the Parties currently intend to establish by the final Management Agreement, including the following:

1. FTA/FDOT

a. The land that will be utilized for The Underline was acquired and the Metrorail system constructed with funding from the Urban Mass Transit Administration (UMTA), since renamed the Federal Transit Administration (FTA), from the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), and from local public funding sources; therefore, all Parties acknowledge that Transit is required to comply with all applicable FTA and FDOT regulations and guidelines, including the obligation to ensure that any use of The Underline does not interfere with transit operations and Transit's obligation to maintain continuing ownership of The Underline property (including all land, permanent structures and appurtenances located thereon).

2. Miami-Dade County (Miami-Dade Transit / Parks Recreation and Open Spaces)

- a. MDT is the property owner and transit facility operator.
- b. PROS shall oversee the construction of the capital improvements in accordance with the Master Plan authored by James Corner Field Operations and approved by all Parties and any subsequent revisions to be to such Master Plan as deemed necessary and agreed by all parties fully recognizing that the master plan is a guiding document that may change over time as the design process gets finalized.

3. The Underline Management Organization

a. A public non-profit organization qualified under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code will be structured as a governance board. This organization will be subject to the Florida Government in the Sunshine Law and Florida's public records laws. The Management Organization will have public representation from all Parties to this agreement, Miami-Dade County, the various municipalities affected by The Underline, and community representatives. The Management Organization will be charged with the responsibility to approve and deny programming proposals, fund operations and capital improvements, and, in collaboration with PROS, will ensure maintenance and regulatory compliance of The Underline with all applicable county, state and federal regulations.

4. Friends of the Underline

a. Friends is responsible for supporting fundraising efforts for capital improvements, and, along with the Management Organization, operations (including but not limited to maintenance and programming). Friends may develop marketing and programming plans to promote public use of The Underline, subject at all times to review and approval by MDT, applicable county, state and federal regulations.

5. Timing

a. The Parties both agree that they are committed to working together to reach a final Management Agreement in an expeditious manner.



The BPMP and TMP will be presented at the April City Commission for adoption. The City beachwalk system serves as the coastal East Coast Greenway and over 5,000 bicyclists and pedestrians utilize this corridor daily. The beachwalk currently extends about 4.5 miles of the city's 7 miles of oceanfront. Once this corridor is completely constructed, residents and visitors will be able to safely enjoy this scenic trail.

Under the leadership from City of Miami Beach Mayor Phillip Levine, the Administration has been leading a Coastal Bikeway Task Force with the purpose of exploring opportunities to develop a continuous bicycle pathway that would connect Miami Beach with Fort Lauderdale along the coastal region. This Task Force is comprised of representatives of coastal cities along the proposed pathway connecting these two jurisdictions, including the cities of Surfside, Bal Harbour, Sunny Isles, Hallandale, Golden Beach, Hollywood, and Fort Lauderdale. This Task Force also includes the Florida Department of Transportation Districts 6 (Miami-Dade County) and 4 (Broward County), the Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) for Broward County and Miami-Dade County, as well as the Bicycle/Pedestrian Coordinators of the two counties.

The City of Miami Beach has been serving as the Chair of the Task Force. More specifically, the Transportation Department is the City's lead Department in collaboration with the Environmental and Sustainability Department. The goal of the Task Force is to develop recommendations on an implementation plan, including funding strategies. The SUN Trail has been at the center of discussions and the Task Force fully supports the goals of the program.

This regional initiative supplements the localized efforts outlined as part of the BPMP and TMP, and would serve as an excellent alternative mode of transportation connecting various coastal cities in a very unique way. Overall, the development of a continuous pathway between the cities of Miami Beach and Fort Lauderdale would be an infrastructure improvement to bicycle networks and a regional transportation asset connecting various cities along the route.

The City of Miami Beach is committed to supporting this critical investment in our greenways and trails network. Further, for any East Coast Greenway segments funded through the SUN Trail program in our jurisdiction, the City of Miami Beach will assume responsibility for operational and maintenance costs related to those segments and address as part of the local budget process.

We look forward to working with the State to provide greater opportunities for our residents and visitors to safely walk and bike to their destinations and enjoy the health benefits of these activities. Thank you for your consideration for this funding initiative.

This facility will provide a unique seven-county continuous trail facility from Indian River County south to Monroe County. Upon completion, this seven-county trail will encompass roughly 320 miles of uninterrupted connectivity for non-motorized users, connecting to nationally recognized natural areas and resources, historic and cultural landmarks, historic downtowns, and educational institutions including K-12, colleges, and universities. 

Upon completion, this seven-county trail will encompass roughly 320 miles of uninterrupted connectivity for non-motorized users, connecting to nationally recognized natural areas and resources, historic and cultural landmarks, historic downtowns, and educational institutions including K-12, colleges, and universities. 



The Palm Beaches is experiencing remarkable growth in its tourism assets, including a number of new hotel, retail and entertainment projects underway throughout The Palm Beaches. County data shows that 805 new rooms were added in 2014 and 2015 with nearly 1,000 more rooms in development for 2016.

This expansion of infrastructure is a direct result of growing consumer demand that also creates local jobs for the development, construction and operation of these facilities.

The record-high 6.3 million visitors to The Palm Beaches in 2014 generated a \$7.3 billion economic impact on the destination, and supported 63,000 jobs. As a leading economic sector, tourism accounts for one job for every 100 visitors to The Palm Beaches, with each visitor directly spending an average of \$768 and bringing a total of \$1,175 in economic impact. These visitors rely on our roads, which suggests the value of this initiative and its importance for FDOT and the public.

For the year 2014, St. Lucie County had an inventory of 4,934 hotel, motel, RV sites and condo rentals, which facilities generated \$3 million in room taxes. According to the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity Report of October 2, 2013, hospitality and leisure jobs account for 13.4 percent of the county work force.

Among visitors, the county sees an increasing number who arrive by bicycle and who, otherwise arriving by air and/or by car, ride bicycles during their stays. St. Lucie County constitutes a vital link for the East Coast Greenway along its Maine-Florida route. Data for the economic impacts of bicycle touring are summarized at http://www.adventurecycling.org/routes-and-maps/us-bicycle-routesystem/implement-a-us-bike-route/benefits-and-building-support/economic-impact/.

Accordingly, St. Lucie County has invested in many ways to market to the bicycle touring market. The county in 2010 developed a Bicycling & Trails Master Plan. It has built almost five north-south miles of its proposed network to AASHTO standards, which miles have been designated by the Greenway Alliance. The County Transportation Planning Organization has been first among the 13 counties of the Greenway through Florida to request that signs for the Greenway be posted along its entire route that traverses FDOT right of way. Indeed, the TPO is at work now with FDOT District 4 for permitting these signs.

FDOT can provide additional important assistance for touring cyclists by allowing the posting of East Coast Greenway way-finding signs at intervals along through its entire 13-county Florida route. Such signage programs are now in place through most of the 14 Greenway states north of Florida to Maine, These signs are important for more than cyclists' safety. They tell cyclists that Florida is part of a national trail system that generates word-of-mouth marketing to the cycling world. Cyclists know they're welcome in Florida.
