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## Citizens React To Proposed Amendment To Grayton Beach State Park Unit Management Plan

Citizens recently had the opportunity to give their input on plans for the addition to Grayton Beach State Park (GBSP) of property on its west end and a proposed day use area at Little Redfish Lake, along with other proposed changes to the previously-approved unit management plan for the park. Two public meetings were held in Walton County on the proposal on June 13 and June 14, both at the Northwest Florida State College Center in Santa Rosa Beach. The first meeting was in an open-house format, the second a meeting of the Grayton Beach State Park Advisory Group to obtain that group's comments and recommendations, along with those of other members of the public in attendance.

Grayton Beach State Park currently contains 2,187 acres and is located along the gulf and CR-30A in south Walton County. The park property is located both south and north of the county road. The park has eastern and western units connected in the center by narrower park property, with the western unit featuring rental cabins. The eastern unit features campgrounds, beach access, a boat ramp on Western Lake, canoeing, kayaking, fishing, and other activities. At the June 13 meeting, Daniel Alsentzer, a planner for the state Department of Environmental Protection's (DEP) Office of Park Planning, spoke in detail about the park and the proposed amendment to its unit management plan, which had been approved in 2013. Approximately 75 people were in attendance at the meeting.

Park plans are usually updated every 10 years.

Alsentzer explained that the Florida Park Service had received some National Resource Damage Assessment (NRDA) funding in 2016 in connection with settlement of claims related to the BP Deepwater Horizon oil spill, and that, as a result, there were plans for projects at eight of the 174 state parks in Florida through this funding.

Proposed for GBSP was the acquisition of seven acres at the dune lake outfall of Little Redfish Lake at the west end of the park property, to be managed as part of GBSP. At 10 acres in size, Little Redfish Lake was described as the smallest of Walton County's globally rare coastal dune lakes.

A day use area to be located within the western unit of the current park property was proposed along with the seven-acre acquisition at the lake outfall. This would require moving planned tent sites that had been part of the previouslyapproved park plan to another location in order to put day use area facilities in that location. Alsentzer indicated that there had been discussion of Walton County funding day use facilities and associated parking. A conceptual land use plan for the proposed Little Redfish Lake Day Use Area called for "recreational and interpretive access to Little Redfish Lake and the Gulf beach." The park's only beach access is currently located two miles east of the new proposed day use area.

Featured as part of the Little Redfish Lake Day Use Area would be a proposed paddling launch on the lake and an observation deck over the lake. According to the proposed plans, a new 24space parking area to be constructed within the current park property would provide access to the eastern shoreline of Little Redfish Lake by a new boardwalk . The parking area would include a small restroom. A path extending south from the new parking area would connect to the existing beach boardwalk, providing beach access for Little Redfish Day Use Area visitors. Cabin guests would access Little Redfish Lake and the beach boardwalks via a path extending from the cabin area.

As part of the plans, approximately 2.5 acres of current roadway and cleared area within the park would be restored to scrub. It was also noted that the majority of the day use area would use existing cleared area and roadbeds. The relocated 12-site tent camping area plus bathhouse and associated 24-space parking area would occupy a two-acre site east of the cabins and on the east side of the cabin access road. Tent campers would have access to the Little Redfish Lake Day Use Area by path from the adjacent cabin area.

Alsentzer emphasized that the new day use area would offer new opportunities for beginning paddlers in a smaller lake. After Alsentzer's presentation at the June 13 meeting, attendees raised objections that their comments were not taken in a public format. The objections were shut down quickly, and park personnel advised that they would continue to be available to talk with attendees one-on-one. The personnel also provided information on how to proceed with making written and online comments on the proposed amendment. In addition, attendees were invited to attend the advisory group meeting the following day where they would be

#### able to speak.

Attendance was much reduced at the June 14 meeting, but several citizens did attend and speak to the gathering, which included park officials and other DEP personnel.

Celeste Cobena, a south Walton County resident, member of the advisory group, and representative of the local Beach to Bay Connection conservation organization, said, "I recommend denial of this proposed amendment to the unit management plan."

She explained that, although she would like to see the purchase of the seven-acre property, she did not think that benefit would outweigh the negative impact of the proposed plans on the park. Cobena urged for the proposed new recreational components to be placed in the eastern unit of the park—and for the state to focus on improvements associated with existing paddling opportunities on Western Lake in the eastern unit. In this way, she reasoned, beginner and disabled paddlers would be better served by that than they would be by the park building the proposed long boardwalk for them to access Little Redfish Lake.

Cobena also expressed concern about what she termed "absolutely no control" in connection with the proposal to open up the new day use area and additional access to the beach. "Any number of people can go in there...you'll get over capacity very soon," she warned. While there is currently a very peaceful situation for the cabin guests, this could change with the amenities associated with the new day use area and leave cabin guests "in a vulnerable condition," Cobena told the park officials.

Cobena also brought up potential impacts of putting a dock on this small coastal dune lake and the possibility of invasive plants being brought into the lake on day use guests' boats.

In summary, she advised for the addition of recreational opportunities in the eastern unit or north of CR-30A rather than in the western unit as proposed. If the property acquisition were tied to the plans for the western unit, Cobena advised for not proceeding with acquiring the property. Diane Rickman, a member of the advisory group representing the Florida Paddling Trails Association, said her only concern was the 500-foot-long boardwalk that paddlers would have to traverse with their boats to get to the Little Redfish Lake Day Use Area. She added that leaving the path as a trail would actually be easier for paddlers carrying their boats.

Alsentzer responded that a track system for transporting boats along the boardwalk was envisioned. Bob Murphy, a geologist and a member of the group representing the Grayton Beach Neighborhood Association, said he was "totally for" the purchase of the outfall property and was of the opinion that the outfall should be under state management. However he was also concerned about the paddling aspect. "It's a small lake, and it's known to have alligators," Murphy said of Little Redfish Lake, warning of danger to beginning paddlers if they were to fall over in the lake.

He also wondered if the new public parking, the addition of the new tent camping, and bringing more people in for beach access could impact the quiet enjoyment of the cabins in the western unit. Murphy also brought up the issue of eagles nesting near Little Redfish Lake and warned that, with more traffic with paddlers, monitoring might not be sufficient to mitigate impacts on the birds. Like Cobena, he advised that the recreational component of the project be placed on the eastern side of the park "where the impact is already there." Tony Anderson, Walton County District 5 commissioner and a member of the advisory group, said he wanted to clear up rumors that the county and Walton County Tourist Development Council (TDC) had "pushed for" the plans. "We were asked by DEP to partner with them," he said.

Anderson said it was his understanding that addition of a recreational aspect at the park would be required in order for the funding for purchase of the seven-acre property to be available.

"We have the opportunity to save a beautiful piece of property," Anderson said, while acknowledging that there would be some impacts. He said he would "hate to see" a developer obtain the property and for it to be turned into something "that none of us want."

"There is a buildable lot there," said Jason Cutshaw, TDC director of administration. He said he would like to see the property purchased for addition to the park. He was appreciative of the opportunity to be part of the effort to acquire the property.

"Recreation is not to degrade the conservation of the resource," said Cynthia Alexander, Grayton Beach resident and advisory board member. "This plan goes out of its way to do that."

She commented that she fully endorsed the previouslyapproved 2013 park plan, which does provide for additional recreational opportunities. The plan has not been fully implemented as this time.

Alexander warned that opening up the day use area with the associated additional beach access would result in people "parking everywhere" to go to the beach. She also echoed previous comments about the eagles that hunt and fish in the lake—and that the lake is home to alligators.

Alligators tend to retreat from humans when there is room to do so, Alexander told the group, but there will not be room in the small lake for them to do so. "They will have no place to go, and they will get aggressive," she warned, adding that Little Redfish Lake is not the place for disabled paddlers. Walton County's desire to increase beach access should not be allowed to impact the park plan, Alexander concluded. She emphasized that the western unit of the park is "highly sensitive" and full of endangered plants. Little Redfish Lake resident Bill Crane, an advisory group member said he did water sampling for the lake on behalf of the Choctawatchee Basin Alliance. He reported that of all Walton County's coastal dune lake, "it's the healthiest."

Crane said that use of the lake and outfall had increased with construction of hundreds of homes in the area, with hundreds of people accessing the outfall and parking on the beach near it. Speaking for himself and for others living on the lake, he identified as most important the preservation of the outfall and allowing it to migrate in the natural and characteristic manner for dune lake outfalls. Crane said that he had worked toward getting people involved in the potential purchase of the outfall property with the aim of preserving the outfall and keeping Little Redfish Lake healthy.

He echoed concerns expressed by others that it should be ensured that there is not parking "everywhere." Crane said he would also be concerned if the 24-space parking area associated with the day use area doubled or quadrupled in size in the future. Among his other concerns were debris, invasive plants being brought into the lake, and the possibility of park guests going onto private residential property on the north side of the lake.

In addition to other comments by advisory board members, several citizens in attendance spoke at the meeting. The first of those, Santa Rosa Beach resident Bonnie McQuiston, called acquisition of the outfall "a wonderful idea." However, she said she wondered why the county was involved with the project. "Is this just another public access for the TDC?" she asked. McQuiston also pointed out that there are strict prohibitions in Walton County on clearing in the vicinity of the coastal dune lakes. McQuiston, who lives on Alligator Lake, reinforced the warnings of other speakers about danger from the animals and argued against encouraging use of the small lake by "the most vulnerable" of paddlers.

"This new plan to me is wrong," McQuiston summarized.

Draper Lake resident Barbara Morano agreed that purchase of the outfall was a good idea but complained that bicyclists had been "left out" of the day use area plans. She was not in favor of putting canoes and kayaks in the small lake due to potential negative impacts. "I think we have a workable plan," she said of the previously-approved 2013 park plan. South Walton County resident Carolyn Zonia displayed photographs of the eagles nesting in the Little Redfish Lake area. She spoke in favor of the property purchase but against "opening it up" with the day use area as proposed. Sine Murray, DEP bureau chief for the Office of Park Planning, confirmed Anderson's previous observation that the NRDA funding being proposed would only be possible for a project combining a recreational component with the land acquisition. She expressed gratitude for Walton County having expressed interest in extending funding for the recreational facilities that would allow the property purchase to move forward.

Cobena said it was her understanding that the recreational amenities could be put in another area than the western unit of the park.

Larry Morgan, a DEP representative in attendance, confirmed that nothing would require the amenities to be place in the western unit. However, he said that there would not be sufficient NRDA funds for the recreational component plus the land acquisition. So, in order for the project to be possible, it would be necessary for the county (or another entity) to fund the recreational improvements, he explained. Cutshaw said the amount of funding discussed for the county to provide had been \$1.3 million. He said that once the recreational component had been decided on by the state, he would research which of the TDC bed tax "pennies" would be possible sources for funding of the improvements. Jim Reynolds, another DEP representative attending the meeting, commented that this would be the "last of the presettlement projects," and that this part of the funding is only for combination land acquisition and recreation improvement projects. With upcoming post-settlement funding opportunities, there will be multiple categories of projects for funding, he noted.

Alsentzer said all comments would be reviewed and taken into consideration, with revisions possible. The project would require final approval by the state Acquisition and Restoration Council in public hearing in Tallahassee.

## **State looks at land next to Grayton Park**

The Florida Park Service has the opportunity to purchase a tract of land on the southwest side of Little Redfish Lake, but needs funds from a Natural Resource Damage Assessment grant to be able to afford to do so.

The land is adjacent to Grayton Beach State Park and valued at \$5 million. A stipulation of the NRDA grant is the public must have access to the land.

Some land owners on the other side of the lake oppose the plan that would go to public use, but if the state's plan doesn't allow access they won't qualify for the NRDA grant and if they don't qualify for the grant they can't buy the land.

If that happens, the property would likely sell to a private entity that could develop it as they wish within landuse code.

The land is partially developed with some " paved roads.

The early plan, if purchased, is to put in a walking trail, a boardwalk, a kayak launch, observation deck, a 24-space parking area, and create 12 tent campsites.

According to the DEP, Walton County would fund the boardwalk access to Little Redfish Lake, a new paddling launch, observation deck, parking area, restrooms, create tent campsites, and construct a bathhouse for tent campers.

However, Tourist Development Council Director of Communication David Demerest said the only role the TDC has in this is that if all goes through, the state park system may approach the TDC for funds to support developing the necessary infrastructure of trails, parking, bathrooms, etc.

"At that point, we would consider their plan and consider what if any funding would be appropriate, which would have to be voted on and approved by the Board of County Commissioners before going forward," said Demerest. "There has been some talk that this is a TDC project but that's not the case. Whatever happens, it's a long way from us becoming involved."

Not everyone is happy about the proposed purchase and possible changes, however.

A public meeting was held last Tuesday night with a brief presentation with DEP staff on hand.

"It boils down to somebody from Walton County, maybe the Tourist Development Council or management, went to Parks and Recreation in Tallahassee and said we want to put in a 24-car parking lot and a long boardwalk down to Redfish Lake," said Santa Rosa Beach resident Celeste Cobena. "There is

an armed gate on that side and if it's opened, people can come and go as they please with no ranger to keep an eye out. That's not appropriate."

Cobena doesn't believe there should be more recreation on the west side of the park as that would be recreational sprawl and should be contained on one end.

"That area is a big coastal scrub that's not in the hands of the state park and it will be developed. We need places where the natural community can exist. We should not degrade the welfare of this. The majority of people moved here because of our natural resources," said Cobena. "The proposal should be denied. It's public lands held in trust by trustees. Some paddlers were at the meeting who said they would not use the boardwalk and launch."

Little Redfish Lake is known to be inhabited by alligators.

"There are several generations of eagles using the area to hunt and fish and every inch of the land will be used. Don't let recreation take over conservation," she said.

As part of the BP/Deepwater Horizon settlement, the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, Division of Parks and Recreation, can use funds to restore areas affected by the oil spill. The state has shrewdly moved to buy a 7-acre tract that the outflow of Little Redfish Lake sometimes tracks. Anytime we can add land to state parks it's a good idea. For my libertarian friends who earnestly believe land set aside for parks is a poor return on investment, Florida parks generate over \$2.8 billion annually.

When BP settled with the government, in no small part due to the Clean Water Act, they agreed to a comprehensive restoration plan for the Gulf of Mexico. Similar to comprehensive financial planning, this agreement identified five goals: restore and conserve habitat, restore water quality, replenish and protect marine resources, provide and enhance recreational opportunities, and monitoring the plan.

The acquisition would conserve habitat while protecting marine resources, particularly Walton County's iconic and globally rare dune lakes. Little Redfish Lake, unlike it's big brother to the west, Big Redfish, has minimal development. The land purchase makes sense and I applaud the state for going forward.

Deepwater Horizon recreational damage estimates range from \$527 million to \$858 million. To mitigate losses, language from BP's agreement calls for "creation of infrastructure, access and use opportunities." In response, the draft amendment to Grayton State Park's 10-year unit plan for calls for enhancing recreation in the western portion of the park. However, in the next paragraph, the report states recreational opportunities could be addressed by building "improved or new infrastructure." Grayton Beach State Park's eastern side has recreational and infrastructure needs. After years of underfunding, these NRDA funds would be an appropriate source. Fix what is already there. Building new infrastructure increases future maintenance responsibilities, too.

One of the restoration approaches cited in the report is to promote environmental stewardship, education and outreach. The existing network of biking and hiking trails in the park could be expanded as part of environmental training and awareness. The report also

stresses specific project design "must consider the potential impacts to natural resources." The unit plan amendment has a proposed boardwalk and kayak landing but the construction would bisect one of the last undisturbed bits of coastal dune scrub in Walton County. Cue Joni Mitchell's "Big Yellow Taxi" because you don't know what you've got 'til it's gone. The proposal also includes a parking lot but that one is too easy.

Since I live just around the corner, if the proposed Little Redfish project goes through, my kayak and I will be there, but that doesn't mean it's a good idea. Don't forget, a society grows great when old men plant trees whose shade they know they will never sit in.

The proposed 500 ft.+ boardwalk to Little Redfish Lake is not a practical or environmentally

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conscience idea. It would fragment one of the last remaining natural scrub communities south

of 30A and disrupt sensitive wildlife habitat. In addition, transporting a kayak, canoe, or stand

up paddle board more than 500-600 ft. would be cumbersome and an undesirable endeavor for

paddlers.

Grayton Beach State Park's main park's infrastructure is in dire need of upgrading and restora-

tion. I firmly believe adhering to the 2013 Unit Management Plan is the best option for the park

and use of any available funding.

• Road repair is needed in main park area along with improvements to the parking area.

• Western Lake bridge is in need of repair or replacement to improve the hydrologic flow between the two sections of Western Lake.

• Currently phragmites is choking the shorelines of Western Lake in several areas. Paddlers soon will not be able to navigate the channel/bridge area between the western and eastern portion of Western Lake.

Improve existing camping areas and add tent campsites in western section of the park along

with a laundry concession in both the main and western camping areas.

• Expansion of the shared-use trail network and adding primitive campsites on the north side of

30A, relocate trailhead, and install safer parking.

Improve the existing boating access in the main park area.

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#### Little Redfish Bald Eagle Nesting Pair

My name is Mike Velotas and I wish to voice major concern for both my neighbors and me on the plans to expand Grayton State Park camp sites, parking, and small craft launch into Little Redfish Lake. The smallest of all the dune lakes and the only "all fresh water" dune lake.

When we started building our house 3 years ago, several of the workers told me about a bald eagle perching in a nearby tree. They sent me pictures every time they saw the bird. Eventually they noticed that there were two of them. Obviously a nesting pair of Bald Eagles. I eventually was able to see them myself. And they are beautiful.

I started taking daily pictures of them--individually and together. Morning, midday, and early evening. And I still never tire of it. Even visitors to our house have been able to view them now. The eagles' favorite tree perch is directly across the lake from me in two thin long needle pines. And I intend to continue taking pictures every time I see them.

The big issue is this: These two trees they land in and fish from are sitting directly on the proposed small craft launch area. And according to the US Fish And Wildlife's National Bald and Golden Eagle Guidelines, areas that encompass nesting, roosting, and foraging cannot be disturbed as this can lead to the eagles abandoning their nesting area. The operative word being foraging. (Please see above mentioned Federal Guidelines on disturbing Bald Eagle zones). *ESPECIALLY PAGE 14*.





This park expansion will cause these eagles to leave. All in the name of tourism. And placing tourists on the smallest lake in the area, at that! We are blessed with these two beauties and I will do all I can to make sure that this parking and launch area never happens. And that this nesting pair can maintain their current and unhindered lifestyle and existence here on Little Redfish Lake.

I would really like for the TDC to rethink their expansion in this area and move it to a larger lake like Western Lake which has much more room for adding these public amenities. Little Redfish is way too fragile for both fauna and flora to be disturbed by development. The propose dayuse lake access on the western shore of Little Redfish Lake is in the Bald eagles' important feeding grounds and sited EXACTLY at the base of the two pine trees from which they hunt. These eagles have been observed here for 2 years, and have taught two generations of fledglings hunt on this small, secluded, protected body of water.

Walton County and the TDC need to drop this park expansion and leave this Bald Eagle zone as is!

The proposed amendment to the Grayton Beach State Park Management Plan must be amended or denied. The amendment would change the optimal boundary to allow BP funds to purchase the overpriced Little Redfish Outfall. Sounds great. But there's a catch! In order to use the funds there must be a recreational component. The fund administrator says it doesn't matter where in Grayton Beach State Park the addition recreation is added. The proposed amendment would fragment a large section of coastal scrub, one of the last remaining intact coastal scrub communities south of 30A (the deer video on my page was taken there).

An alternative to the proposed recreation plan is to put additional recreation in the current day use area. A number of projects have been in the Grayton Beach Unit Management Plan for years yet have been unfulfilled. Dear Sir,

My name is Anita Page. I am a resident of Walton County since 1982. I have lived on Big Redfish Lake since 1991 and am very familiar with Little Redfish Lake as it is in close proximity to me.

I have recently received notice of two public meetings to amend the current GBSP Unit Management Plan (UMP) which was approved in 2013. While, at the time of this email, the actual text of the proposed amendment has not, to my knowledge, been provided to the public, a map and commentary show the focus of the proposed amendment is to allow development on the small park area (approximately 100 acres) adjacent to and including the shores and waters of Little Redfish Lake. The UMP refers to this small parcel as the "Western Unit". (GB 15, 16 and 17) The described projects include:

(1) a proposed public parking lot with 24 parking spaces and a restroom,

- (2) roadway paving of old subdivision roads,
- (3) a boardwalk from the parking lot to Little Redfish Lake with a canoe/kayak launch area at the shoreline,
- (4) an "on-grade" path to the beach from the parking lot and

(5) moving the planned 12 tent-only campsites, originally located in the partially disturbed area now being desired as a parking lot, to a currently undisturbed portion on the east side of the Western Unit.

While I do not know the origin of this proposal, whether it is the state, Walton County/TDC or another party or entity, it is my understanding that the Walton County TDC has offered to fund the development costs of the proposal.

It is also my understanding that the state is attempting to purchase, using NRDA funds, a parcel on the east side of the Little Redfish Lake outfall which is contiguous to the lake shoreline and beach currently a part of Western Unit. The outfall parcel will be managed by GBSP.

As I may not be able to make the public hearings I want to provide my comments to you. First of all I wholeheartedly support the acquisition of the outfall parcel and thank you for pursuing the acquisition. For the reasons outlined below, however, I strongly object to the proposed developments underlying the proposed amendment. I do continue to support the future development plans for the Western Unit already incorporated into the current UMP, e.g., improve cabin beach access, 12 tent-only camp sites.

I feel that the placement of the proposed development on such a small, yet environmentally diverse area, poses significant potential for harm to the scrub community, the shoreline, waters and dunes of a coastal dune lake and will negatively impact the natural experience which is the current focus of the cabin rentals. It is my suggestion that all of the development for additional public parking for beach access and boating opportunities in the current proposal should be located in the main day use area of GBSP and not in the Western Unit. The current UMP already contains provisions which would accommodate the beach parking and boating opportunities which form the basis of the current amendment proposal.

The current UMP provides for a re-design of the large day-use parking area to provide more parking for the public and more efficient traffic flow at the beach access. This will be accomplished within the existing parking area footprint as opposed to the degradation of scrub which will be required for the 24 parking spaces and restroom facilities at the

Western Unit location. The main day use area already has restroom facilities thus eliminating the construction of restroom facilities, installation of sewer and other requirements of restroom facilities close to a coastal dune lake.

The current UMP also calls for the construction of a convenience dock to supplement the existing facilities for launching, docking and retrieving small boats such as canoes, kayaks and paddle boards.

In essence, the current UMP goals provide for all of the needs outlined in the proposal. In addition, the improvements needed to meet these goals can be met through development within areas which have already been disturbed for such uses and which are more accessible for park supervision and assistance to the public if needed.

The proposal fits within the UMP goals for increasing use and facilities within larger the day use area. It does not fit within smaller acreage, high sensitivity Western Unit ecosystem.

The Western Unit is different from the more developed area in the eastern area of GBSP. It is small in acreage and includes the eastern shoreline and waters of one of the smaller globally imperiled coastal dune lakes. Within its compact size the Western Unit contains a plethora of pristine or minimally disturbed natural resources such as a beach, beach dunes, scrub uplands, a small wetland area and a vegetated shoreline and waters of a coastal dune lake. All of these features support a host of listed and non-listed species as outlined in the UMP. As the UMP clearly states:"Western Lake provides the most potential for recreation."... "Due to their sensitivity, size and limited accessibility, the smaller coastal dune lakes, Alligator and Little Redfish Lake, are not suitable for widespread recreational use. However, both lakes provide exceptional natural scenery and provide ideal opportunities for wildlife observation and nature study. Limited access to the shores of these lakes, such as is provided at a modest scenic overlook or trailside bench, would allow visitors to enjoy these natural areas with minimal impact." The UMP further states "...allowing visitors to experience the striking visual quality of these features provides a truly unique experience that is not reproduced elsewhere in Florida. Access to the coastal dune lakes must be balanced with protection in order to preserve these resources for the future."

The shoreline of Little Redfish Lake is a designated "Protected Zone" in the UMP. The UMP states "a protected zone is an area of high sensitivity or outstanding character from which most types of development are excluded as a protective measure." There is minimal sand beach along the lake shoreline. To the contrary much of the eastern shoreline is buffered by extensive saw palmetto, spartina, sawgrass and other species. Most of the shoreline itself is vegetated including at least one state-listed threatened plant, the Droseracea. (FNAI S2 Imperiled)

The Western Unit, while a small unit within GBSP, contains one of the largest, contiguous scrub communities. Virtually the entire undeveloped upland area is scrub, a listed ecosystem. (FNAI S2 Imperiled) The ecological significance of the scrub community is well documented in the UMP.

Currently, the access has a gate which controls access and provides some privacy and security for people who rent the cabins and their guests. Development has been the minimal necessary to provide for access to the cabins, the beach, some walking trails and some small buildings for staff needs. These have predominantly been located in areas previously disturbed by a defunct subdivision effort. Parking for occupants is in their cabin areas. Having visited people there I can also attest that it is generally very quiet. It provides the current guests with more of a nature-based experience in the midst of the highly developed 30A. The development of a separate tent-only camp site, as proposed in the UMP is in keeping with the lower impact, more outdoors oriented living experience provided to visitors staying in the Western Unit.

It is my understanding the proposal includes a public entrance using an honor fee box. Whether the day visitors share the same roadway as the current cabin or future tent occupants or diverge to the public parking lot via a new road, the fact is that the number of vehicles entering the park on a given day can no longer be controlled and that all areas of the park will be accessible to increased human impact. The ramifications of the potential impacts are concerning in this particular ecosystem. As the UMP reflects all units within the GBSP are not alike and uses must be sensitive to the area in which they are allowed. In 2013 a new UMP was adopted which continued the low impact approach for the Western Unit. As an example, it called for the removal of many of the unused remaining paved subdivision roads and restoration to scrub. The increase in recreational use was accomplished with 12 tent-only campsites. This proposed amendment seems to go in the opposite direction by increasing impacts with paving the old subdivision roads instead of removing and restoring them, putting in a parking lot and restrooms where the tent camp sites were intended to be located, moving the camp sites to an undisturbed area on the east side thereby requiring further development, opening the unit to unlimited vehicular day use, opening the coastal dune lake buffer and shoreline to unlimited day boat use in addition to foot traffic, exposing the current cabin areas to increased noise and traffic and potential safety issues as they are very close to the proposed area of increased impact and generally subjecting the waters of the lake and Gulf to additional stormwater exposure.

I support moving the additional parking and boating development activities proposed in the amendment to the main day use area of GBSP and rejection of the amendment. The staffing and infrastructure at the main day use area can better absorb this increase in human impact within an area already improved for such activities. Given there is an alternative location I feel this proposal poses an unacceptable threat to the smaller, more fragile, more isolated Western Unit.

There are still many items that I didn't get a chance to review with you, but I will provide comprehensive written comments as soon as possible, and prior to the June 13th meeting.



1) Regarding the proposed eastern tent sites paralleling Forest Dunes:

a) This poses a major fire hazard for adjoining private property immediately to the south in Gulf Trace and immediately to the east in Alligator Cove. The woods to the west of Forest Dunes have only partially been thinned out via bush hogging but still mostly consists of dense scrub vegetation that, in dry conditions, would burn easily. If this should happen as a result of a rogue camp fire combined with a moderate to strong north or west wind, the wild fire would spread quickly and disastrously to adjacent private property. A few years ago, the Park deliberately chose partial bush hogging precisely because a controlled burn was too dangerous given the proximity of homes.

b) Tent camping does not logically constitute day use.

c) The addition of tent camping brings many more visitors into the Park and thus puts increased pressure on all Park resources and diminishes the experience of the cabin visitors.

d) Regardless of whether or not there is to be tent camping, there should be a new gate at Forest Dunes as close as possible to the 30A entrance for the protection of Park visitors and Gulf Trace residents alike. The Park currently has gates at other access points. To leave Forest Dunes wide open is like locking the front door but leaving the back door open.

2) It should be abundantly clear to anyone who lives along 30A that the number of visitors has increased dramatically over the past few years. For example, traffic jams are a frequent problem during high season. It is a fact that people park or are dropped off on Forest Dunes and then walk into the Park or into the Gulf Trace community. It would seem wise to concentrate Park improvements on raising and protecting the quality of what we offer and not to concentrate on raising the quantity of visitors. We are reaching the limit of how many people can vacation here and still have a quality experience.

a) The incredibly short sighted proposal to add 24 parking spaces and 12 camp sites adds up to at least an additional 150 Park visitors per day – give or take. We are literally paving paradise to put up a parking lot.

b) The plan to increase access to Little Redfish Coastal Dune Lake would significantly impact what should be designated as "protected" as opposed to "recreational." These lakes are exceedingly rare in the world. Their allure is that they are inherently natural and beautiful. Little Redfish Lake is habitat for bald eagles, alligators, water moccasins, and beaver, to name just a few. Bringing in more people with the intention of recreating on the lake is dangerous to both the lake and the people. It is a very small lake and is therefore easily impacted. There should be no question that increased day use (e.g., kayaks, canoes, boardwalks, viewing platforms, paddling launch) would lead to decreased integrity of the lake's ecosystem and its surroundings. Nothing should be done to turn Little Redfish to recreational use. Period.

c) And furthermore, if indeed the TDC is involved, it has a reputation for pushing over-development and has no place in this discussion over preserving and protecting our Park natural resources. The TDC has a different mission which in not consistent with the purpose and mission of the Park system. We are in favor of the Park buying Little Redfish outfall with its own funds if the goal is to protect it.

3) The proposal to restore old roadbeds is a very good idea.

We sincerely hope that these concerns and the concerns of many others like us will be taken very seriously.

I do not support the proposed amendment to the 2013 Grayton State Park Management Plan.

As a 25-year Seagrove Beach permanent resident who has participated in many conservation efforts including serving on a few Advisory Groups for park planning for other NW FI parks, I understand the need to balance conservation of park natural resources with public use and enjoyment of recreational opportunities found in our state parks.

However, the proposed amendment would be detrimental to one of the last sizable scrub communities left in South Walton. In my time living here I have seen many, many acres of scrub community lost to development. As development and redevelopment proceed the only natural scrub areas left will be on protected publicly owned land such as this remnant in Management Zone 16 of the Western Unit.

Habitat loss is the major contributing factor in the decline of the Choctawhatcee Beach Mouse and scrub communities upland of the dunes are essential to their ability to survive tropical storms. This area of the park is also home to rare plants which are losing their habitat as the scrub is lost or fragmented.

I support the modest tent camping area proposed in the 2013 Management Plan and the restoration of the disturbed areas north of the cabins, as well as the other 2013 proposed improvements elsewhere in the park.

Regarding Little Redfish Lake, it is too small to support the uses proposed in the amendment. In addition it is dangerous due to the presence of alligators. It is a totally inappropriate place especially for children and inexperienced kayakers for that reason. I personally have kayaked in Western, Eastern and Camp Creek Lakes, but I would never kayak in Little Redfish Lake, nor would I wade or walk along the shore, and especially not with small children.

I would not object to a natural trail to a raised overlook that allows for views of the lake and birdwatching while keeping the shore undisturbed and keeping visitors safe. I believe a previous park plan included this as a proposed improvement.

I have heard that the South Walton Tourist Development Council favors the proposed parking lot and may even have plans to contribute funds and/or sublease it. I understand that all our state parks are under financial pressures and that such an arrangement is tempting for that reason. However, the objectives of the TDC are at odds with the goal of balancing resources and recreation. The park should not pay the price for the County's lack of long term planning.

Please reject this proposed amendment.

- New shared use trail with parking on the north side of 30A
- primitive campsites north of 30A-Floating dock near existing boat ramp in Western Lake.
- Improve existing Beach parking lot.

The public must demand that the Florida Division of Recreation and Parks manage our state parks to ensure the survival of plant and animals species and the conservation of finite and renewable resources.

#### RE: Proposed unit management plan amendment for Grayton Beach State Park

Dear Mr. Alsentzer,

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the proposed unit management plan amendment for Grayton Beach State Park. There are two parts to my comments.

#### PART 1: I am opposed to the amendment for the following reasons:

- The proposed use is not coherent with the 2013 plan for increased recreational access without degradation of the natural communities, including destructive impacts or takings on several species and protected zones.
- The use would immediately exceed the proposed capacity of 24 parking spaces, and exceed the park's recreational carrying capacity that ensures access while preserving the natural values of the site.
- The plan appears to violate two federal prohibitions of the Federal FL-95P OPA (Otherwise Protected Area) Coastal Barrier Resources Unit.
- The plan violates Walton County's Land Development Code, Coastal Dune Lake Protection Zone 4.02.06 for stormwater runoff from proposed parking lot, restroom, repaving, and shoreline destruction at boat launch.
- A sublease by Walton County or the Walton County TDC (Tourist development Council) for an uncontrolled and unlimited day use beach access is incompatible with the mission of the park.

# PART 2: I support the land acquisition of the Little Redfish Lake outfall known as the Kelly parcel.

• It is a critical acquisition that supports the conservation of vanishing communities in their natural state, particularly the outfall of the smallest coastal dune lake, Little Redfish Lake, and critical habitat for snowy plover, least tern and black skimmer that nest on the flat sand at lake blowouts.

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- The funding for this acquisition is the second phase of the Trustees' Phase V early restoration plan (the Florida Coastal Access project) and it requires enhanced recreational opportunites of adjacent lands. The studied, vetted and approved 2013 Unit Management Plan for Grayton Beach State Park already identifies increased recreational access coherent with with conservation and protection of natural communities, and coherent with the recreational carrying capacity of the park. Those projects should be funded and completed instead of the proposed amendment.
- I note that the acquisition is not mentioned anywhere on the proposed amendment.

I have lived next to Grayton Beach State Park for thirty years. I have served on the Advisory Council for the Grayton Beach Management Plan in 1987, 1991, 1996, 1999, 2005 and 2012.

Like many of my neighbors and the surrounding communities adjacent to Grayton Beach State Park borders, we have been the best of neighbors.

We have been neighbors in the purest sense of the personal meaning, and we have been neighbors in a deeper sense of community, cooperating in a common vision of the appropriate stewardship and land management of this unique, beloved and valuable natural resource. Because we live here we follow a continuum more discerning and forward-looking than Walton County government's approach to over-development and uncontrolled tourism.

I carefully reviewed the approved 2013 Unit Management Plan for Grayton Beach State Park for the basis of my comments. As a Walton County resident I also have some personal experience that I bring to bear.

A brief history of Grayton Beach State Park is highly relevant to comprehensively understand the proposed amendment under consideration. GBSP was 356 acres in size from 1964-1985. It was originally "Section 16 land" set aside for schools and the State Board of Education transferred it to Department of Environmental Protection, Division of Recreation and Parks. In 1985 the park acquired 10 parcels of land with **Save Our Coasts Trust Fund** and **CARL (Conservation and Recreation Lands) bonds**, increasing the park size to 2,227.92 acres. These bonds are part of the public trust to manage these lands for the purpose for which they were acquired: conservation, restoration and recreation.

Walton County ferociously protested this acquisition after the fact. It is a very wellknown part of Florida history, and well known to DEP. It was the citizens of Walton County who supported the conservation and restoration of these acquisitions. In fact, the

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impetus for Amendment 5 to the Florida Constitution was borne out of this conflict in Walton County that consumed Tallahassee's and the Florida Cabinet's time for the next 5 years. Amendment 5 extended indefinitely the state's ability to sell bonds to finance environmental land acquisition and created a more difficult test for the disposal of land purchased for conservation purposes, thereby ensuring that **what is bought for conservation, stays in conservation.** It was put to the voters in November 1998 and passed with 72 percent of Florida's electorate, a record landslide.

Walton County citizens have been compelled to continue to defend and protect our parks and forest from Walton County schemes to divest and develop these lands even unto today. Every square inch of private land in south Walton County will be developed (and over-developed) in the near future. The County does not cease to cast its eyes upon what is still green and desire to pave it over and overrun it with tourists.

I believe Grayton Beach State Park is and should remain protected. The Resource Management Programs are designed **to preserve for all time** the representative examples of natural and cultural resources of statewide significance. The Management Authority and Responsibility is vested in Chapter 258, Florida Statutes and Chapter 62D-2 Florida Administrative Code, the Division of Recreation and Parks policy:

"to acquire typical portions of the original domain of the state which will be accessible to all of the people, of such character to emblemize the state's natural values; <u>conserve these natural values all time</u>, use and maintain these lands is such a manner as <u>to enable the people of Florida and visitors to enjoy these values</u> without depleting them."

Thus, necessary restrictions on public access is not denied access – it is preserved access.

The land use management of Grayton Beach State Park is governed by Sections 253.034<sup>1</sup> and 259.032<sup>2</sup>, Florida Statutes, Chapter 18-2, Florida Administrative Code.

Statute 253.034 includes, for example:

(1)All lands acquired pursuant to chapter 259 shall be managed to serve the public interest by protecting and conserving land, air, water, and the state's natural resources, which contribute to the public health, welfare, and economy of the state. These lands shall be managed to provide for areas of natural resource based recreation, and to ensure the survival of plant and animal species and

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the conservation of finite and renewable natural resources. The state's lands and natural resources shall be managed using a stewardship ethic that assures these resources will be available for the benefit and enjoyment of all people of the state, both <u>present and future</u>.

... All multiple-use land management strategies shall address public access and enjoyment, resource conservation and protection, ecosystem maintenance and protection, <u>and protection of threatened and endangered</u> <u>species</u>...

Statute 259.032 includes, for example:

7(b) "All lands managed under this chapter and s. 253.034 shall be managed for public outdoor recreation which is compatible with the conservation and protection of public lands."

and (9)(a) "The Legislature recognizes that acquiring lands pursuant to this chapter serves the public interest by protecting land, air, and water resources which contribute to the public health and welfare, providing areas for natural resource-based recreation, and ensuring the survival of unique and irreplaceable plant and animal species. The Legislature intends for these lands to be managed and maintained in a manner that is compatible with conservation, recreation, or both, consistent with the land management plan and for the public to have access to and use of these lands <u>if public access would not harm the resources</u> the state is seeking to protect on the public's behalf."

The Proposed Unit Management Plan Amendment will degrade the natural communities, including destructive impacts or takings on several species and protected zones. The last FNAI (Florida Natural Areas Inventory) study in GBSP was in 2012, pursuant to the 2012 review of the Unit Management Plan. In the specific area of the proposed amendment, GB-15, GB-16, and GB-17, FNAI identifies both protected zones and endangered species.

GB-15 is the eastern shoreline of Little Redfish Lake, a globally-imperiled coastal dune lake and an Outstanding Florida Water. It is designated a Protected Zone: "a protected zone is an area of high sensitivity or outstanding character from which most types of development are excluded as a protective measure."

GB-16 is the Coastal Scrub area bounded on the north by Highway 30-A and the south by the beach, on the west by Little Redfish Lake and the east by Alligator Lake. It is one of the last intact stands of Coastal Scrub, a listed ecosystem, FNAI S2 Imperiled. Coastal scrub is home to listed plant species, such as gulf coast lupine (*Lupinus westianus*) and largeleaf jointweed (*Polygonella macrophyla*). Nearby Seagrove was named for this natural community of picturesque salt-pruned dwarf oaks. The Unit Management plan states, "Access to coastal scrub should be controlled through <u>designated at grade</u>


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<u>footpaths</u>. Paths or walkways through this community should be minimized as these paths serve as corridors that allow coastal winds and salt spray to penetrate into the scrub creating soil erosion and mortality of trees, thus further fragmenting the community. Additional accesses or development should avoid coastal scrub where possible to prevent impacts and keep it in good condition. Motor vehicle use in this area should continue to be limited or eliminated."

However, the new amendment calls for the construction of a large and wide handicapaccessible boardwalk throughout the scrub, the re-paving of roads and the addition of new asphalt connectors, and the introduction of new and heavy automobile traffic.

In fact, the existing roadbed that is now designated for re-paving by the proposed amendment has been slated for removal and scrub restoration by the approved Unit Management Plans since it was acquired.

Further, even though the new parking area is limited to 24 spaces, every local knows the parking area, the driveway in, and the sides of 30-A will be overrun with parked cars the day this access would open, just like any other Walton County TDC beach access. The park will be overrun by beach goers seeking a new way to the beach, and they will degrade and destroy the natural communities with overuse. Very close to the new 24 parking spaces is another protected zone, a basin marsh.

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The lack of security and the lack of controlled access, including the ability to lock a gate when capacity is reached is no small concern for locals, adjacent homeowners or for the Cabin guests. Day use is completely incompatible with the Western Unit of the park, and should be restricted to the developed portion of the Eastern Unit where the rangers are present and where the access and capacity is monitored and controlled.

GB-17 is the Gulf of Mexico beach dunes and beach of the southern boundary of GB-16. Here is Choctawhatchee beach mice (*Peromyscus polinotus allophrys*) habitat, a federally-listed endangered species. Nesting shorebirds including two state-designated threatened species, least terns (*Sternula antillarum*) and snowy plovers (*Charadrius nivosus*), should nest along the dune front and in dune blowout areas. Shorebirds need connectivity between the beach dune community and foraging habitats such as the shoreline and/or the coastal dune lakes. In particular, corridors should be free from human disturbance during the breeding season to allow shorebirds and their flightless young to make the journey from the nest to available foraging habitats. In addition, this is one of few dark areas left for nesting sea turtles. Federally-listed loggerhead (*Carretta caretta*) and green sea turtles (*Chelonia mydas*) nest on the beach and in the dunes here.

Boardwalkers and kayakers will quickly tire of paddling in tiny Little Redfish Lake and soon make their way to the outfall and the beach, increasing foot traffic along the coastal dune lake shoreline and outfall and damaging this extremely fragile area.

It is important to note that Little Redfish Lake was uniquely closed to the Gulf in its natural condition, with a stable sand berm covered with vegetation.




GB-15, outfall, Little Redfish Lake, 1997

However, several county manipulations of the outfall have artificially opened it. It was opened to rapidly clear septic field debris from an adjacent beach community brought by

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
Hurricanes Dennis and Ivan storm surges. It was again disturbed when Walton County filled the natural sugar sand berm with a larger berm of trucked-in, non-native sand for protection against the BP oil spill. The sand was to be removed when the danger passed. However, it was merely pushed aside, re-opening the lake, and that gray and rocky sand remains today, 7 years later.

The natural berm keeps trying to heal itself, which would restore habitat for the Snowy plover and the Least tern. However, heavy beach usage from increased tourism means many curious visitors trampling the lake's outfall, ruining the vegetation and disrupting the attempt of the natural berm to reform. The uncontrolled access of proposed boardwalk visitors and kayakers will increase this damage as they will inevitably make their way to the outfall.


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GB-15, damaged shoreline outfall, walked down by foot traffic from beachgoers, Little Redfish Lake, 2017

On a non-scientific survey this past weekend, the state listed-threatened Spoonleaf sundew (*Drosera intermedia*) was easily observed at the shoreline at the proposed boardwalk dock overlook and kayak launch site. It is the first known occurrence of Spoonleaf sundew in Grayton Beach State Park. It has been observed in Topsail and Deer Lake. It was not present on the 2012 FNAI survey.


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GB-15, Spoonleaf sundew (Drosera intermedia), shoreline, proposed kayak launch site, 2017

When the FNAI study was completed in 2012 there were no Bald Eagles at Little Redfish Lake. However, for the last two years the eagles have made their home nearby and fish on the lake, and have raised and taught two generations of fledglings to fish there. The two trees from which the eagles surveil and hunt are in the exact location of the proposed boardwalk and kayak launch.

As South Walton development rages on wildlife will seek its last refuge in the conservation areas. Wildlife will begin to concentrate there, as we have seen with the Bald Eagles. Endangered plants cannot pick themselves up and move. These are their last stands of natural communities in their original domains. If the protected species cannot be protected on land set aside for their conversation where, then, are they to be protected?

#### **Protected Zones**

The 2013 approved Grayton Beach State Park Unit Management Plan also identifies several protected zones within the area now slated for development on the proposed amendment.

Little Redfish Lake, is a globally-imperiled coastal dune lake, an Outstanding Florida Water and it is a designated Protected Zone.

The 2000 Unit Management Plan specifically stated, "Due to the rarity and fragile nature of the two other coastal dune lakes, Little Redfish Lake and Alligator Lake, and the pressure they are under from developed homesites and the country road, **public access for canoeing, kayaking and power to the lakes from the park is not recommended**." The 2013 Plan states **"the native shoreline vegetation should remain intact and buffers should be set to prevent development along the shoreline."** 

Why would an amendment now promote a dock and kayak launch and the certain encouragement of the impact of uncontrolled access to the shoreline and outfall of Little Redfish Lake?

The American alligator (*Alligator mississippiensis*) is a federally-designated threatened species and Little Redfish Lake is home to a few. They are opportunistic feeders and generally incompatible with humans. When I queried park and planning about Little Redfish Lake being too small and fragile to accommodate public kayaking and canoeing I was informed that was *why* it has been chosen: for the disabled, new kayakers and

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children to have a safe place to learn.

However, alligators inhabit all the coastal dune lakes. I would not swim, or even stand in water along the shoreline of Little Redfish. And, because it is such a small lake, (unlike Western Lake, which is approximately 20x larger, for example) the alligators have nowhere to retreat from splashing and disturbances. They may become aggressive and defend the intrusion into their habitat. Alligators on Alligator Lake will follow boats and bump them. Alligator Lake is only slightly larger than Little Redfish Lake. And, as we all know, you can remove dangerously large alligators, but their places are quickly re-filled by newcomers.

#### FL-95P, Otherwise Protected Area

In 1990, GBSP received a special federal protection when Congress designated it an OPA, an Otherwise Protected Area, and placed it in OPA Unit FL 95-P.

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In 1992, Congress assimilated all OPA units into the Coastal Barrier Resource System (CBRS).

In 2006, a technical correction of the FL 95-P OPA unit map was passed by Congress. The correction placed an additional 1,582 acres, including 1/2 mile of pristine sugar sand shoreline, dune fields, and coastal dune lake shoreline into federal conservation that had been erroneously excluded in 1992. This was 901 fastland acres and 681 associated aquatic habitat acres of State Park land.<sup>3</sup> Congress replaced its incorrect Department of Interior map with the certified State of Florida Map, prepared by Brady Harrison, GIS Coordinator, Office of Park & Planning, Florida Department of Environmental Protection, and submitted it to DOI, USFWS for redesignation of OPA Units. This made the GBSP OPA unit coterminus with the GBSP boundary.<sup>4</sup>

It appears to me that the plan amendment may also be in conflict with the Federal protection of GBSP. One of the three important goals of placing land in a Coastal Barrier Resource Unit is **to protect the natural resources associated with coastal barriers**. One of the ways this is accomplished is by prohibiting most new federal expenditures that tend to encourage development or modification of coastal barriers including, **assistance for environmental studies, planning, and assessments that are required incident to the issuance of permits or other authorizations under federal law.** (CBRA (16 U.S.C. §3502(3)).

Limitations on and exceptions to Federal expenditures includes "maintenance, replacement, reconstruction, or repair, **but not the expansion** of publicly owned or publicly operated roads, structures, and facilities." <sup>5</sup> The plan amendment requires the repaving **and expansion** of the existing road in the Western Unit for the purpose of day-use by the public, even though the roadbeds are slated for removal and restoration under the approved 2013 plan.

#### Summary

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GBSP is extremely popular with both locals and visitors who cherish it for its wide, expansive views of nature and a glimpse of Old Florida. It already frequently reaches capacity throughout the year. The 2013 Unit Management Plan defined increased recreational expansion after careful surveys of the natural areas. I support the implementation and funding of the 2013 Approved Unit Management Plan for increased recreational capacity. (See Appendix 1.)

I also support Walton County funds or Walton County TDC funds <u>being donated</u> to the park for <u>park-designated</u> restoration, conservation and improvements, **but I do not support the TDC subleasing or managing any portion of GBSP**. Their mission is different, and indeed *in conflict*, with the mission and management of public lands.

For all the reasons stated above, I oppose the proposed unit management plan amendment for Grayton Beach State Park.

#### Appendix 1

### Improvements & Carrying Capacity 2013 Grayton Beach State Park Unit Management Plan

Maintain the park's current recreational carrying capacity of 2,028 users per day. Expand the park's recreational carrying capacity by 288 users per day:

- New shared use trails and a trailhead will expand opportunities for hiking and bicycling. **4 miles of new trails** north of 30A in Eastern Unit will accommodate an additional 160 people daily. Future plans will allow the trails in the Eastern Unit and Western Unit to network. [Partial work begun by Americorps volunteers, but no current work underway]
- An additional eight spaces of parking to accommodate current visitor capacity at cabins and two universally-accessible parking spaces. Also, reorganization of the current cabin parking lot to increase capacity.
- Addition of 10-12 tent-only campsites in the Western Unit in the disturbed area, next to cabins. Several small areas of stabilized parking spaces would be located a short walk from the campsites. Up to two sites would be designed to meet ADA accessibility guidelines.
- 4 Primitive campsites north of 30A, 2 in Eastern Unit and 2 in Western Unit. Each primitive campsite has room for 2 tents. Carrying capacity can increase up to an additional 32 people daily.
- 2 pedestrian crosswalks on 30A to allow park visitors to safely access trails north of 30A: one at cabin entrance and one at the new (relocated) trailhead west of the Western Lake bike bridge.
- New Trailhead parking lot just west of Western lake bridge: approximately 15-20 spaces. [Under construction, currently needs funding from CSO to continue]
- Floating convenience dock near the existing boat ramp on Western Lake to provide space for mooring small boats and allow visitors to arrive at the park by boat.
- Reorganization of existing beach access parking pad at Western Lake to move traffic more efficiently and accommodate additional parking spaces, to increase efficiency and capacity while limiting the need for additional paved surfaces.

Additional suggestions not in plan:

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• add a bikepath on each side of Main Park Entrance road all the way to the beach.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the proposed Unit Plan Amendment, June 2017, for Grayton Beach State Park. I am a fairly recent homeowner in Gulf Trace, the neighborhood within the State Park boundaries. In preparation for commenting on the proposed amendment, I read the original 200 page Unit plan recently approved for the park to familiarize myself with aspects of the park.

First, I was surprised that the original 10-year plan was already proposed for amendment. I suspect, in reading the amendment, that the urgency was brought on by plans to increase public beach access in the County and the western unit of Grayton Beach Sate Park seemed a place where this could happen. However, to me, the western portion of the park is a special place where the cabin rentals exist and those guests can enjoy the coastal area – unencumbered by large numbers of day guests. It is unique in this aspect and different from the eastern portion with its day use areas and RV sites. It is also different from the other parks along the Walton County coastline – each having their own unique attributes. There does not seem to be any need to hastily amend the current plan for Grayton Beach State Park.

I was surprised by the original plan's access to Little Redfish Lake, as it appeared to be too small to support much more use. The amended plan retains that access but it would be even more heavily used with day use guests and additional tent campers in the park. To me, this does not seem like a good thing for the well being of the lake and its environment.

The amended plan has two other aspects that are worrisome. First, the expansion of the parking area would lead to more day use but if shuttles were used to bring in many more guests than the parking lot accommodates, that would appear to overwhelm the park's carrying capacity to the detriment of the paying cabin guests. It might deteriorate their experience to the point that the cabin rentals might have their revenue reduced. Add to this increased use of Little Redfish Lake and the park may simply be too busy for its own long-term well being. It should not become simply another public beach access.

Second, the proposed camping sites located on the eastern side along Forest Dunes Drive seem better served in the western side of the park as in the original plan. I believe that campers on the east side will use a "short-cut" down Forest Dunes into the privately owned roads of Gulf Trace or cross the road and traverse south through the dunes along Alligator Lake to access the beach and Alligator Lake. While the beach has customary use, the roads and beach walkovers in the neighborhood do not. They are owned and maintained by the residents of the neighborhood. While it may seem that the correct way to access the beach would be west to the park dune walkover, a shortcut seems inevitable under the amended plan. It is also not unlikely that if day use guests crowd the park, they may also choose to take the shortcut to the beach, ride their bikes to the neighborhood beach walkovers, etc. While welcome to walk down the beach from the park to Alligator Lake or on to Grayton Beach, park guests trespassing through Gulf Trace would not be a good thing.

It is my conviction that the current unit plan remains in effect for the remainder of its 10-year term without amendment.



The Bannerman community has great respect for the work your department does in protecting the coastal dune lakes and providing first class public access to those lakes that are spacious enough to accommodate the citizens and visitors to Walton County, however we strongly oppose the introduction of a paddle board launch and boardwalk to Little Redfish Lake, part of which adjoins our community. This unique and rare ecosystem, developed over thousands of years, is simply too small to handle the introduction of what could be many paddle boarders, paddle board festivals etc. Assuming 2 paddle boards per vehicle, the proposed 22 space parking area with two additional ADA spaces could introduce over 40 people into this tiny lake at any one time.

Many of us are avid paddle boarders. There are many larger lakes in the area that we enjoy using, particularly Western Lake, Lake Powell and Choctawhatchee Bay. These larger ecosystems are better able to handle the human element, picnic lunches, trash collection, restrooms, etc.

Little Redfish Lake contains many fresh and salt-water fish, including bream, bass, pan fish, catfish, redfish, flounder, speckled trout and mullet. An eagle nests near the western shoreline and a mature alligator also lives in the lake. Little Redfish Lake and it's serenity is the jewel of our community and we have always been good stewards and guardians over it. Your own literature aptly describes the unique landscape surrounding the lake:

"Embedded within the scrub several small natural communities occur, including depression marshes, mesic and wet flat woods, estuarine unconsolidated substrate and estuarine tidal marsh...[the] scrub community occurring adjacent to beach dunes is significant habitat for Choctawhatchee beach mouse.

As you know, the beach mouse is endangered. Many rare plant varieties also grow in the park. It took a long time for Little Redfish Lake to become the treasure we see today. We feel strongly that it should be left alone.

We are residents of Little Redfish Lake subdivision which will be adversely impacted by the proposed Unit Management Plan Amendment. We have been a property owner in that subdivision for more than 5 years. We are against the proposed Amendment, especially the portions allowing public boat access to Little Redfish Lake and the size of the proposed new parking area.

We believe the proposed amendment is not consistent with the Park's primary purposes, and materially deviates from the existing Plan in several important ways.

The Park's stated purpose is to provide for resource based public outdoor recreational activities, especially saltwater **beach** activities and hiking. Public boating access to the lake does not further those purposes. Of 6 items listed in the Plan outlining the Park's significance, 5 of them are to "protect" things such as the three coastal dune lakes; only 1 of the 6 listed items is to provide residents and visitors with participation opportunities - clearly your primary mission is to protect the Park property.

Given the large overdevelopment along 30A, the Park is one of the few natural areas left along 30A. Your primary mission is to preserve that, and not allow it to be used by the TDC and Walton County to promote more visitors and beach access at no cost to them. I view this Park like the thousands of acres of national park land held in preservation where the goal is to allow that to remain in its current state without visitor traffic, not a Yellowstone park whose primary purpose is to promote visitor access.

The Plan states that the condition of Little Redfish Lake in 2013 when the Plan was adopted was only "fair". I believe it has declined since then. Its condition likely will only worsen if your Amendment is implemented.

With respect to the Water Area, the current Plan provides that " due to the sensitivity of these rare resources, widespread or high intensity recreational access is not recommended".... "Due to their sensitivity, size and limited accessibility, the smaller coastal dune lakes, Alligator and Little Redfish, are not suitable for widespread recreational use"... "Limited access to the shores of these lakes, such as is provided at a modest scenic overlook or trailside bench, would allow visitors to enjoy these natural areas with minimal impact".

Parking for 24 cars that would allow anywhere from 50-100 people at a single time from this lot with the potential for 2 -4 times turnover of that amount per day, plus further additional visitors from the cabin area of the Park, is the type of high intensity access the Plan sought to limit, yet would be allowed under the proposed Amendment. There are no limits on the number of visitors per day to the parking lot. The Amendment allows for boating access to the lake, which conflicts with the Plan's provisions that there should be limited access to the shoreline. Western Lake already has boat access and is a larger lake better able to handle boat traffic.

Increased access to Little Redfish Lake will lead to increased trash and debris on the lake which will invariably adversely impact both the Park itself and the adjacent Little Redfish Lake subdivision and its property owners. Look at any public beach in the area and you see litter everywhere including cans, bottles and suntan products. All this will be dumped into this small lake when you allow boaters and paddlers onto it. Presence of more humans on and near the lake will adversely impact the natural habitat of wildlife in the area, including nesting bald eagles and the occasional alligator that is seen in the lake. This lake is just too small and fragile to allow significant human access onto the shoreline or public boat access. The beauty of Little Redfish Lake is the fact it is small , natural and pristine, and it should be kept that way. The beauty of the Lake can be observed from 30A itself without allowing more access directly onto the lake from the Park .

We are in favor of leaving the Plan as is. If change is needed, at most this amendment should allow for the walk path and a small observation area deck near the lake shore consistent with the current Plan - with no public boat , kayak or paddle

boarding access. No swimming should be allowed. Since visitors invariably like to break the rules and roam off permitted areas (as has happened with the dunes) the path and observation area should be clearly marked with signs restricting visitors to the path and deck. No hiking should be permitted on or around the shoreline. The parking area should be scaled back to 10-15 spaces to further limit use at any point in time, and there should be a total daily visitor limit on access to the parking lot

#### Grayton Beach State Park - Management Plan Amendment Florida Forest Service Comments 6/14/2017

The proposed amendment to the Unit Management Plan for Grayton Beach State Park seems to disagree with the approved plan in the following ways:

- Management measures set forth in the plan pertaining to the coastal dune lakes are, "to improve and maintain good water quality, and restore and maintain historic hydrology."
- The current plan contains an objective to, "improve the hydrological conditions and functions of the coastal dune lake community."
- The Land Use Component of the management plan states, "due to the sensitivity of these rare resources, widespread or high-intensity recreational access is not recommended". (FNAI considers coastal dune lakes to be globally rare and imperiled [G2/S1].)
  - However: Re-paving roads and establishing a new parking area do not seem conducive to restoring and maintaining hydrology of the area. Furthermore, minor changes to surrounding uplands may have significant negative impacts on the hydrology.
- An objective of the plan is to "prevent disturbance to nesting and wintering shorebirds".
  - However: Increased beach use on the western unit may negatively impact nesting shore birds. Several of these species use this area for nesting, as well as the outflow area of Little Redfish Lake.
- The lesser used beach area on the western unit serves as nesting habitat for sea turtles.
   O However: Increased use of this area may have adverse impacts to the nesting sea turtles.
- The beach dunes serve as habitat for the Choctawhatchee beach mouse, a federally endangered species.
  - However: Human disturbance at the dunes may significantly alter the dunes and associated plant communities, thereby potentially disturbing the mice.
- The beach habitat within the park is protected under the federal Coastal Barrier Resources Act.
  - An assessment should be conducted to see if new development is permitted under this act.

The current plan contains proposed recreational projects other than what is being proposed now. Those proposed projects already within the approved plan (such as new shared-use trails, primitive campsites north of County Road 30A, a tent only camping area on a previously disturbed footprint where the proposed parking area related to this new proposal would be, and a redesign of the existing day use parking area that could increase capacity while limiting the need for additional paving) have not yet been implemented on the ground, but are slated to increase the park's carrying capacity *without* impacting undisturbed natural areas. This newly proposed amendment, while also increasing recreational carrying capacity, would impact areas that have previously been relatively undisturbed.

I am the President of the Homeowners Association of Little Redfish Lake and represent the 15 owners of our sub-division.

I plan to attend and provide these comments tonight during the public meeting to discuss the Draft UMP Amendment but wanted to provide a written copy of our comments for you and others that will be considering this matter.

We oppose the planned amendment as currently drafted for the following reasons:

1) Little Redfish Lake is the smallest and arguably the most ecologically fragile of the Dune Lakes along 30A. We believe the planned development which provides unlimited public access, launch facilities and a parking facility for 24+ cars to be an inappropriate use of parkland that has been set aside for conservation.

2) We believe the development will be harmful to the ecology of the lake and its endangered and protected species which include resting areas for bald eagles and nesting grounds for the snowy plover; and recommend at the very least an environmental study be commissioned with State biologists to fully understand the environmental risks of the proposed amendment.

3) We believe the kayak planned recreation use to not be in the public interest. The lake is very shallow and varies in depth significantly when it breaks out since the BP alteration of its outflow. The lake includes public health hazards including large alligators (6 plus feet) and barb wired fencing from earlier times which we believe is dangerous to kayakers. Given the recent tragedy at Disney World we believe at the very least the alligator activity would need to be publicly disclosed and posted, as it was at one time at the lake outflow, which would deter usage particularly with families with children. We would note there are far better kayaking options on bodies of water such as Western Lake that has both the size and protected borders to accommodate unlimited public usage.

4) We believe the public dock / launch facility which would be less than 50 yards across the lake to our neighborhood, and its' closest home, to be a security risk and fear kayakers would ground their boats on private property and wander our shorelines and result in a significant increase in trash and debris along the lakeshore.

# Comments on Grayton Beach State Park Proposed Unit Management Plan Amendment, June 2017

I am Celeste Cobena, resident of Walton County since 1991, and have served on numerous advisory groups for State Parks in Walton County and Point State Forest.

#### I object to and recommend denial of the proposed amendment to the Grayton Beach Unit Management Plan(GBUMP) June 2017.

Issues and concerns with the Amendment: There are a number of problems with an unsecure entrance, the iron ranger will allow no limit to the number of users to the area. Landscaping and curbs will not stop people from parking over them, or in the road, it happens all the time in beach neighborhoods. Beach users will drop off a carload of people and beach equipment then go park on 30A or the driver goes somewhere else until called to retrieve the beachgoers, I see it all the time at the Stallworth walkover. Another recent phenomenon is a shuttle service that operates along 30A that brings tourist from nonbeachfront communities to neighborhood beach accesses, this leaves unlimited numbers of users at location. The unofficial expansion of the parking and beach use will ultimately lead to an official expansion of the parking further reducing and negatively impacting this coastal scrub area.

Additionally, the remote location and unmanned entrance will be a magnet for illicit activity including the dumping of unwanted pets. Grayton Beach State Park already has a feral cat problem; this will expand it to the western unit that has not previously had this problem.

An iron ranger will leave cabin visitors vulnerable to all sorts of intrusions from "can I use your bathroom" to physical assault and theft. Yes, this happens along 30A. The secluded location makes for easy targets. Currently the cabin visitors enjoy a peaceful nature experience secure behind a gate, much like the gated communities along 30A. Both Florida residents and visitors come to the Grayton Beach State Park Cabins for the quiet nature experience, in what they believe is a secure area. Opening up the western unit to uncontrolled day use will change that experience and open the cabin visitors up to burglary, vandalism and other crimes that are on the rise in South Walton since the population of residents and visitors has expanded.

#### Quotes from 2013 GBUMP:

# "The Park protects a representative sample of Florida's native gulf coast beach dune and Scrub communities"

A parking lot should not be located in the middle of one of the largest scrub communities south of Highway 30A causing direct impacts as well as fragmentation. Restoration should occur in this area of the park. Our State Parks are the only places where any natural communities will survive in South Walton. Every inch of private land will be developed.

"The Park protects portions of three coastal Dune Lakes that support diversity of rare and endemic plant and wildlife species" "In the management of a state recreation area, major emphasis is placed on maximizing the recreational potential of the unit. However, preservation of the park's natural and cultural resources remains important. Depletion of a resource by any recreational activity is not permitted. In order to realize the park's recreational potential, the development of appropriate park facilities is undertaken with the goal to provide facilities that are accessible, convenient and safe, to support public recreation use or appreciation of the park's natural, aesthetic and educational attributes"

Little Redfish Lake is the smallest of the globally imperiled Coastal Dune lakes. Once boaters have launched from the proposed dock there's not a whole lot of places to paddle. Small circles aren't much fun. Only options will be landing on private property on the west side of the lake or trample the outfall area and shore. People want a destination. Looking at the map provided it appears that the trek to the dock be will just about as long as any paddling experience.

Along the shore of the lake at the proposed dock site lives the listed plant spoonleaf sundew. To my knowledge this has not been noted in Grayton Beach State Park. Makes you wonder what else has been missed! In fact, I understand that there has been an observance of eagles feeding in Little Redfish Lake and perching in trees in the Western Unit. I believe this has gone unnoticed by the Division of Recreation and Parks.

Will boaters be allowed to bring in their own watercraft? If so, Little Redfish Lake would be vulnerable to any number of invasive species. If like at Topsail Preserve watercraft are provided the boating facility will take up an inordinate amount of the shoreline of this small lake.

I do not see how the long handicap accessible boardwalk with no restroom facilities on the lake is truly accessible or convenient, or how the alligator inhabited lake is safe for small boats. Western Lake and Campbell Lake are larger allowing alligators to move into remote areas of the lakes away from human activity.

I am not opposed to more beach access in South Walton. In fact, for over a year and a half I have advocated for more public beach access in Walton County. I have attended and spoke at a number of Walton County meetings or public hearings on this issue and served on the Walton County Customary Use Committee. However, Our State Parks are the only places where any natural communities will survive in South Walton.

This proposal is recreational sprawl. Focusing human activity and development in specific areas of the park is the way to achieve both of the goals and mission of the Division of Recreation and Parks. Conservation Goals can be met by leaving large tracts open to only non-motorized access so that people seeking an ecotourism adventure will have the opportunity to experience nature in all its glory. Focusing beach and boating recreation in the Eastern Unit allows for a safe nature based experience with added conveniences and accessiblity that many people have come to expect.

#### Summary of problems with the Proposed amendment:

-a parking lot should not be located in the middle of one of the largest scrub communities south of Highway 30A.

-A parking lot with uncontrolled access will soon be over capacity with spillover parking into habitat and roadways

- will become a dumping ground for unwanted animals

- The "honor" system will allow for access for any number of illicit activities.

- The safe and quiet environment enjoyed by cabin guest will disappear.

-The remoteness of the cabin area will allow for ransacking of the cabins with no one noticing.

- Little Redfish Lake too small for proposed uses.

-The boat launch on Little Redfish Lake is not suited to the environment.

-Ridiculously long boardwalk, particularly for a handicap accessible dock.

- Environmental impact studies inadequate or incomplete.

# To improve and expand Recreation at Grayton Beach State Park the recommendations in 2013 GBUMP should be implemented. Among those are as follows:

-new shared use trail with parking on the north side of 30A. Hiking and biking by both residents and visitors is exploding, this is evident in the number of bicycle shops that have opened in the last year or two along 30A and feeder roads. This recreational use is very popular year around particularly non-summer months and red flag days on the beach

-primitive campsites with trails on north side of 30A. Some people want the quieter natural experience that Grayton Beach can uniquely offer on the north side of 30A.

-universal access dock or convenience dock and near existing boat ramp in Western Lake. Western Lake provides more shoreline to implement some of the solutions for universal access such as soft launch with outdoor carpet or floating dock with rail and launch chute. Vehicles could be driven right up to the launch facilities. Check FLDEP Canoe/kayak launch site and Accessibility Document by Doug Alderson, Paddling Trails Coordinator. Division of Recreation and Parks Office of Greenways and trails.

- improve existing beach parking lot. The antiquated design and wasted space with medians could likely provide 20 or so extra parking spaces at the Eastern Unit Beach access.

It appears that some sort of deal has been brokered with Walton County Tourist Development Council (TDC) to purchase a 7-acre parcel at the outfall of Little Redfish Lake using Natural Resource Damage Assessment (NRDA) funds. The Walton County TDC has offered to fund the Proposed unit Management Plan Amendment because NRDA requires a recreational component but does not supply funding for it. Phil Coram with DEP Division of Water Restoration Assistance said in a phone conversation that the only recreation component presented to The Florida Trustee Implementation Group was the proposed amendment to the Grayton Beach Unit Management Plan located in the Western Unit of the Park. The Florida Trustee Implementation Group has *not* been presented an alternative recreation plan located in the Eastern Unit.

I recommend denial of the proposed management plan amendment.

I Further recommend that The Florida Division of Recreation and Parks present to the Florida Trustees Implementation Group the recreation components in the Eastern Unit of Grayton Beach State Park in the current approved 2013 plan to fulfill the NRDA Grant to acquire the Little Redfish Outfall parcel.

In a true Democracy open debate is essential and this was missing at your meeting as the audience clearly articulated to you. You said that the meeting of June 14 from 9am to noon would accept open public comments, but we are at work then. It seemed that the format was designed to quell comment, regrettably.

We have homes in both Gulf Trace and Bannerman Beach. The proposed alterations to the cabin entrance clearly have a negative impact on the Gulf Trace Community, it's ecosystem and with camping, it's security. The impact on tiny Little Redfish Lake could be an immeasurable loss to the Bannerman community and it's fragile ecosystem. We have spent years guarding the sanctity of the lake and it's ecosystem. It is the jewel of the community and should not be touched.

We are truly surprised that the Florida Department of Environmental Protection would be the sponsor for such an invasive plan into a small ancient ecosystem that took thousands of years to create. Thank you for a well planned, efficient program presented and hosted by a variety of professionals. The displays used to outline the proposed changes were also very helpful. Your program and format was very well done.

I support your plan for improved roads to and around the cabins and the addition of tent camping space and the requisite bath house.

I support your improved paths/deck access to the beach.

I support increased parking as presented for access to all noted above.

I STRONGLY OBJECT to the addition of access to Little Redfish Lake for the purpose of paddle craft in the lake with access to the gulf.

Mr Michael Velotas makes a very good case, which I agree with, for the preservation of that environment for the nesting eagles at that lake. He has fully documented their perch trees and longevity with which they have occupied this area and lake for their feeding and, I assume, nesting habitat. He provided two detailed documents from the US Fish and Wildlife Service that would support the removal of the path to the boat ramp and the proposed deck from the Grayton State Park plan.

I would suggest that the lake is better served for the eagles and humanity if a low profile, natural path for hiking be the only access to that lake. In addition, you are aware of the excellent boat ramp on the Eastern section of Grayton State Park that allows full access to the Gulf if one chooses to utilize it. Not to mention, that any SUP or kayak enthusiast can easily walk their boats/boards down the eastern section boardwalk to the Gulf or the newly proposed updated path from the tent/cabin section in the western sector. Individuals who are truly interested in nature will support and understand the removal of this portion of the plan. The typical family who comes to this area and spends time along our coastline, is not interested in walking more than a few blocks to reach the water. This is to comment on information shared June 13, 2017 in a Public Meeting.

- I note that the proposal to acquire 7 acres at the outfall of Little Redfish Lake is not in the draft document shared for proposed changes to the plan.

- I note the link given to find the "entire management plan amendment document" only leads to a general page, and I had to search around to figure out where the final document sits, which will be confusing to the public in general. You should make a greater effort to insure the proposal reviewed in the meeting is consistent with the draft document, and that the document under review, along with the base Unit Management Plan are easily accessible via a direct link. Anything less than this causes speculation and mistrust about what else is not included or being hidden.

1) I am concerned with the plan to encourage public use of the Western Unit via this plan. The loading on the resources there would be acceptable with cabin renters and tent campers, and would provide a much more pleasurable experience for those guests, who are paying a premium for this access. I would not open this to the public. Local County and TDC people are all about shoveling more people into the area, and seem at times to have no appreciation for the quality of the experience, which is the only reason people keep coming back. We deeply need some low use areas both for the guality of Recreation usage, and for preservation of the resource.

2) Little Redfish is too small and shallow to provide a reliable kayaking experience, and the rationale that it is more "novice friendly" than Western Lake is flawed. There is very little use of Western Lake now, and it is sufficient to handle the demand for kayaking, and there are parts which should be intimidating to no one who is safe in a boat.

3) Novice kayakers will likely not haul their kayaks 300-600 feet down the boardwalk to the proposed lake access. Little Redfish is mostly undisturbed now, with only a few residents on the others side using it for anything. I don't believe the added benefit to a very few novice kayakers justify building access or taking the risk of the trash left behind by those novices and day users.

4) A boardwalk will detract from the natural feel of the walk down to Little Redfish Lake, while not providing much in the way of ADA access, and if you keep the Western Unit reserved to overnight residents, the traffic should not be an erosion issue. If there is an erosion issue, I would prefer that you provide bark or chip coverage for the trail instead of building a structure.

5) Moving the tent camping facility to the East where you have placed it is better than having it over next to Little Redfish Lake. This tent facility will increase usage to the point where my concern about opening this unit to the public is more important. The cabins and tent sites are plenty of people served, and Day Use is inappropriate.

I attended the June 13th public meeting regarding the expanded UMP for the above park. Following are my thoughts and comments:

- I support state acquisition of the 7 acres near the outfall of Little Redfish Lake.

- I support the rehabilitation of the current path/road areas to return as much as possible to natural habitat.

- I support the tent camping sites on the eastern side of the Western
Unit, vs the area next to Little Redfish Lake as found in the current UMP
- I strongly object to day use additions to the Western Unit of the park.

We are annual family pass holders, and normally go to GBSP to the beach and to kayak in Western Lake. The damage that the ever larger crowds do to the beach, dunes and lake are unmistakable. Just last week, during a sunset visit to the park, we saw at least three large craters or sand castles that had been left for the night during sea turtle nesting season. We saw numerous cigarette butts, peanut shells and fruit rinds in the sand. We saw family portraits being taken near the toe of the dunes, with children encroaching on to the dunes.

Extending this damage and disrespect to the other end of the park via a day use beach access point is absurd.

One of the arguments given for a kayak launch onto Little Redfish Lake is that it allows novice/beginner paddlers a less intimidating environment. The current boat launch on Western Lake is on a calm and sheltered

portion of the lake, and quickly turns left into the channel area that is very calm and beginner kayak friendly. There is no need for additional kayak access to another coastal lake when the current one meets the need described. I never see more than 4 or 5 kayaks, SUPs or canoes in the area of the existing boat launch, so clearly it is not over capacity.

There is a point at which our beaches can hold no more people. We are reaching that point. The Walton Co. TDC has acquired at least 4 beach front parcels in the last year to provide additional public beach access points and parking along 30A. That is enough. Don't start messing up the relative pristine examples of nature we still enjoy along the coast.

Our roads, bike path and restaurants are getting more and more crowded which detracts from the visitor experience. If we try to bring yet more people here, those crowds are only going to be more frustrated. Before long, they are choosing other spots for a more relaxed family vacation. When are we going to recognize enough is enough?

In short, the outfall purchase, relocation of tent campsites and restoration of paths and roadways will enhance the cabin and camping visitors' experience.

However, there is NO need to put day use access in this part of the park, and NO need to add hundreds of people a year onto one of the few coastal dune lakes with very little development.

I would prefer to see this money spent on the areas of the park north of 30A where there is one pit toilet and very little interpretive infrastructure currently. Let's enhance THAT side of the park and draw more visitors there. Quit overloading an already fragile and strained part of our environment.

Walton County is under pressure to pave over as much of the coastline as possible to allow for more and more beach Parking. I have been an advocate for more public beach access, however it should not happen at the expense of our rare and fragile ecosystems that will only survive in our conservation lands.

The Western Unit of Grayton Beach State Park :

- One of the largest contiguous coastal scrub community in South Walton.
- contains several depression marshes which are important breeding grounds for amphibians, and marsh and wading birds.
- the shore of the smallest of the globally imperiled Coastal Dune Lake, Little Redfish Lake cannot support a dock and kayak use.

• bald eagles are nesting in this 100 acre woods.

Grayton Beach State Park already has a large recreation area in the eastern section with a ranger station for monitoring entrance into the park. In 2013 the Grayton Beach State Park Management plan was approved. This current plan has improvements to the park that will provide enhanced recreation opportunities but not have negative impacts to the ecosystems. Some of these are:

• New shared use trail with parking on the north side of 30A • primitive campsites north of 30A-Floating dock near existing boat ramp in Western Lake.

• Improve existing Beach parking lot.

The public must demand that the Florida Division of Recreation and Parks manage our state parks to ensure the survival of plant and animals species and the conservation of finite and renewable resources.

# Unit Management Plan Amendments

Impressions of June 13, 2017 Meeting

Approximately 40 to 50 people attended the two hour meeting at Northwest Florida State College. Although I did not speak with everyone present, I did speak with most. I heard no one express support for the proposed changes planned for Grayton Beach State Park West – other than the State employees who were there to promote it. I was most struck by the following contradictions and ironies:

- 1) The meeting was advertised as an "open house" gathering. It was decidedly closed. Direct questions and opinions from the audience were actively discouraged. Such Questions and opinions could be submitted in writing with the promise that someone would read them eventually. It was clear the audience was not at all happy with these restrictions. This kind of infringement on free speech is repugnant and more befitting a tyranny than a democracy.
- 2) With 12 tent campsites planned just to the west of Forest Dunes, the entry road for the Alligator Cove and Gulf Trace communities, fire is a major concern. Approximately two years ago, the Park cleared a portion of that same area via bush hogging rather than using a controlled burn because such a burn was deemed way too dangerous given the proximity of homes. And yet the idea of campfires getting out of control does not appear similarly too dangerous. Not logical and not credible. Campers will have

campfires and, sooner or later, one of them will get out of control. Period. God forbid it does not happen under very dry conditions and when a north wind is blowing. When I asked one of the State promoters if they had a major league liability insurance policy, he just smiled.

- 3) If one Googles "Disney World" and "Alligator," one can quickly reach the logical conclusion that inviting human paddlers, swimmers, or even waders into the waters of Little Redfish coastal dune lake where alligators swim is a bad idea. Though the Park inexplicably deems Little Redfish safe, it has put up warning signs regarding the danger of alligators on, get this, Alligator Lake – also a coastal dune lake and located only about a half mile to the east. Both lakes have alligators but apparently only the ones in Alligator Lake are dangerous.
- 4) Which brings us to the Park's pledge, rooted in their fundamental mission, to balance human recreational needs with the protection and preservation of the natural habitat. Does anyone want to hazard a guess as to how the State will handle the inevitable collision of swimmers and alligators. Is there any doubt that the reptile will lose and be banished from its natural environment. Not that they are dangerous, but the same will happen to the Eagles that periodically nest at Little Redfish. These shy, reclusive and magnificent birds will simply leave as the press of more and more people materializes. So will the beaver, the ospry and the occasional Florida black bear.
- 5) Which brings us to the significantly increased number of visitors encouraged by the proposed management plan. Given the proximity of the proposed tent village to Forest Dunes Drive, does anyone want to guess which path Park campers will use to access the beach? Will they walk all the way across the Park to the Park's beach walkover or will they take the much shorter route down Forest Dunes, through Gulf Trace and over that community's beach

walkovers. Ten points if you picked the latter. It is only logical and, unfortunately, unpreventable.

6) Which brings us to the close and positive relationship that Gulf Trace has had with the Park in the past. In the same spirit of preservation and protection that informs the Park in its mission, Gulf Trace worked to become the first sea turtle friendly community in Walton County. In combination with the Park's efforts on behalf of nesting and hatching the sea turtles, Gulf Trace and the Park co-created one of the longest stretches of dark beach in the State. Another collaboration between both communities has been the Friends of Grayton Beach and Deer Lake State Parks. This CSO, founded by Gulf Trace residents, has raised tens of thousands of dollars - all dedicated to the needs of these parks. And, finally, many have forgotten that in the mid 1990's the State of Florida was ready to swap Grayton Beach State Park West for the land now known as Topsail Hill State Park which at that time was privately owned and slated for development. The State badly wanted to acquire and preserve the Topsail Hill land but could not afford buying at the time. But it was willing to give Grayton Beach State Park West over to the would-be Topsail developers in a land swap. A group of Gulf Trace residents successfully sued the State of Florida and stopped the swap from happening. Long story. A few years later, the State raised the money via bond issue and was able to purchase Topsail Hill. The State ended up owning both State Parks. How ironic given that they definitely could have ended up owning neither. If the lawsuit had failed, the deep irony is that the meeting yesterday regarding the unit management proposal for Grayton Beach State Park West never would have happened and Topsail Hill State Park would likely not exist.

BP settlement money is intended to remedy the negative environmental impact from the 2010 oil spill. This proposed park plan amendment will be more harmful to the environment than the oil spill.

I oppose development of Grayton Beach State Park Western Unit which will negatively impact the natural experience. A boat launch on Little Redfish Lake will pose significant potential harm to scrub community, shoreline, waters and dunes of a coastal dune lake.

The current park management plan of 2013 clearly states, "Western Lake provides the most potential for recreation. Due to their sensitivity, size and limited accessibility, the smaller coastal dune lakes, Alligator and Little Redfish, are not suitable for widespread recreational use".

What has changed in 5 years?

An honor fee box cannot control the number of vehicles or pedestrians entering the park. All Areas of the Western Unit will be accessible to increased human impact. Parking spaces and restroom facilities on or near Little Redfish Lake will unquestionably degrade the lake.

If acquisition of Little Redfish Lake outfall known as the Kelly parcel requires more public access to Grayton Beach State Park, additional parking for beach access and boating can be located in the main day use areas, not in the Western Unit. Goals of the management plan can be met within these already disturbed areas which are more accessible, manageable and secured by park supervision.

I oppose the proposed placement of 14 tent camp sites near unsecured private roads in the Western Unit. Security of private residences, both east and south of the proposed camp areas, will be threatened. Tent sites with campfires will pose an inherent danger of fire to nearby residential private properties. It is this threat that prevents controlled burning in this same area by park personnel. The intent of BP settlement money is not to inflict environmental damage. It is not to decrease private property values nor to create a negative environment in residential communities. The proposed park plan amendment does exactly that, and more. Additional public access to the park with more tent camp spaces, a handicap boat launch for kayaks and canoes, and additional parking at the beach can be accomplished in the already disturbed main park area. Control of vehicles and human traffic, as well as security for the park, is maintained by the ranger station with gated ingress and egress.

I attended the Open House on 6/13 regarding the Unit Management Plan Amendment for Grayton Beach State Park. The presenter stated that one of the missions of the state parks is to balance recreation and preservation of natural resources (or forgive me-it was something on that order). Balance in this area has been lost! Please do not endanger a coastal dune lake that has escaped much development.

The area in question is rapidly becoming one of the very few places that native plants and creatures may survive. The south Walton area will soon be completely built, paved, planted with turf, exotic species and in a few cases cultivated native plants. Many of the native plants such as the lupine, *Ceratiola ericoides*, gopher apple, woody goldenrod, etc that exist on this tract can not be replaced.

You need to understand what happens on these beaches. I walk the nearby Blue Mountain beach every morning. I pick up, for example, plastic toys, water bottles, torn foam balls, Styrofoam cups, plastic spoons, beer cans, straws, birthday balloons tied with ribbon. It is my understanding that the State of Florida is proposing an expansion of the Western part of this State Park to include more parking, tent campsites and renting kayaks and canoes or paddle boards on Little Redfish Lake.

This is very fragile Park which is home to many protected species of plants and animals and it should be protected and preserved for future generations to enjoy. These rare dune lakes along this stretch of 30A are home to many animals, some of which are not compatible with humans. For the State to promote such activity is just asking for trouble. Visiting tourists from other parts of our Country are not aware of such dangers as was the case at Disney World when an alligator killed a young child from Nebraska. This would be a huge liability for the State to promote and in fact encourage such interaction with such animals in a small lake.

We purchased our property before the State of Florida acquired this land and our community has taken many measures to blend in and try to preserve this precious "preserve". Comments:

Having been in attendance to both the Public Meeting on the night of June 13<sup>th</sup>, and the Advisory Group Meeting on the morning of June 14<sup>th</sup>, and been a member of the Advisory Group representing the community of Grayton Beach, I wish to have the following put on record.

The amendment draft did not include in its text any reference to the purchase of +/- 7 acres of land at the outfall of Little Redfish Lake. It dealt with only the changes proposed to the recreational component which seeks to redirect the development of the western unit of Grayton Beach State Park. This makes the evaluation of the value of the proposed amendments to the management plan confusing.

While we are united in the desire to see the outfall of the very pristine Costal Dune Lake manages by the DEP, most of the changes to the development of the parks Western Unit seem to do more to endanger the special resources of that unit than is warranted.

As to the acquisition:

The area of Grayton Beach State Park encompasses the water shed, the headwaters, and the majority of three of the very valuable and globally significant coastal dune lakes. The outflow of Western Lake and Alligator Lake are already managed by the Park. It should be a priority for the outflow of the adjacent Little Redfish Lake to be similarly managed for the health of the Lake. You will have received many other comments about Little Redfish Lake and its unique character, my comments regarding the lake are concerned with the entirety of the watershed that includes these three lakes that are a part of GBSP. There has been an explosion of development surrounding the park in the last two decades. In many ways, the drainage patterns and hydrological functions of the area have changed and are changing. These lakes will be under pressure and the stewardship of the DEP and the State Park System is the only way to protect and preserve them. The inclusion of the outflow of Little Redfish Lake is essential to the Lake, the nesting birds, as well as the preservation of this magnificent site for future generations of Florida residents and guests. I want our grandchildren's children to see This special Florida that we protected and preserved for them.



As managers of the vast drainage and outflow system, in conjunction with the State Forest Management, we suggest coordinating with the Forest to study the drainage of the basins, and repair the drainage impediments created by firebreaks as soon as possible after burning. In the 39 years I have lived here I have witnessed the changes in water flow into these Coastal Dune Lakes. We must do whatever we can to correct the impediments to the hydrologic flow from north to south into these special places.

As to the Amended Plan:

Develop a day use area in the western unit of the park.

While it sounds good, the inclusion of day use into this area will, in my opinion, exceed the carrying capacity of this unit of the Park. The reality of influx and multiple use between the cabin renters, tent campers, and day use would overwhelm the fragile nature of the trails and the beach access. The very special character that the cabins have would not be effected by the addition of tent campers, who are usually frugal in accoutrements they carry to the beach. However, as a resident of Grayton Beach I will say that day use brings with it a different character. This would adversely impact the value of the experience the cabin renters currently enjoy. Control of ingress would be difficult to control as multiple hikers going off paths and disturbing the fragile shrub understory.

Provide access to the west of end of the park beach by an existing boardwalk.

There already exists a boardwalk access, if this means the construction of additional boardwalk structure over the dune it would destroy vegetation, scrub, and essential habitat of the protected Choctawhatchee Beach Mouse. This was not part of the presentation I saw.

Construct a 24-space parking area with one small restroom building.

I would recommend against this as per our argument against increased day use in general. The area proposed for this parking was originally indicated for the tent camping area. This is a very good site for the tent camping location. In addition, the area the tent camping was moved as proposed in the amendment, it would be too close to 30A and residential development. The tent camping experience is adversely impacted by the noise of a highway, and the close proximity to a residential development, not to mention the need to carry your equipment up to 300 feet to get to your site. Although this proposed parking site seems on its face to be centrally located, it is in fact close to nothing. It requires a significant walk for access to the beach or the Lake.

Provide boardwalk access to Little Redfish Lake with a paddling launch and observation deck.

I recommend against the installation of boardwalk construction, the reality of utility of this boardwalk and launch is questionable. It would mean carrying a paddle board, canoe, or kayak

about 500 feet along a boardwalk to reach the lake. That would dissuade most paddlers from using it when there is a much better launch at the eastern unit. Additionally, the small size of the lake, 10 +/- acres, and the population of alligators that reside in it as well as its shallow depth with no ready retreat for the wildlife to utilize, make this a dangerous location to encourage paddlers in general. Monies earmarked for this development would be better spent in the enhancements to the launch in the eastern unit as outlined in the 2013 management plan, where park personnel could assess and mitigate impact of the use.

The rest of the amendment is basically what was proposed in the 2013 Management Plan. The return of abandoned roads to a scrub natural community, and the inclusion of the tent site where the amendment puts the parking lot. We support these projects.

As a summation of my comments I totally support the addition of the outflow of Little Redfish Lake into Grayton Beach State Park. This would add value to the entire ecosystem of the park. The recreational component of the use of this NRDA money should be used to perform the development of the western unit as outlined in the 2013 management plan, as well as enhancing the eastern unit by refurbishing the parking, launching, and educational opportunities there. As well as increasing access to the portion of the park north of Highway 30A throughout the park. I understand that Walton County and the Walton County Tourist Development Council has offered to help fund the recreational component required for the purchase funds to be utilized. I will be lobbying our elected officials to see that these proposed changes to the amended management plan are in the best interest of Grayton Beach State Park, and the people of Walton County as well as our visitors.

As hard as the decision would be to make, I recommend that the purchase of the outfall be set aside should the Walton County Tourist Development Council insist on the amended management plan. Saving the outfall of Little Redfish Lake would not be worth compromising the protection of the pristine nature of the western unit of Grayton Beach State Park.



I would like to offer a qualified Thank you for the "public" meeting about the proposed changes to the Grayton Beach State Park Unit Management Plan. Thank you for providing the personnel, time and expertise to explain to residents what the proposed changes may entail. I'm sad to say, however, that no thanks are in order for the inability of the attendees to voice questions and concerns to the audience at large.

We South Waltonians, as a community, rely on one another to discuss and articulate the questions and concerns about issues that affect us directly. We consistently find ourselves between a rock and a hard place when it comes to balancing jobs, the economy, conveniences and amenities, and the one thing that brought us here in the first place - the relatively unspoiled environment. So it was with great sadness that we learned that we could not share our collective thoughts at the meeting.

We love our community, and we love our beachy, forested, scrub and dune areas. So do the threatened and imperiled plants and animals that live in and/or visit our relatively unspoiled areas. This is why family and tourists continue to come to live and visit our area - not to see Disney's version of Florida but Florida the way it was when our parents and grandparents came. This is why we consistently have record-breaking visits to the state park and adjacent areas. We are the real Florida, and so we must ask - are we so short-sighted as to kill the Goose that laid the Golden Eggs? If amending the UMP is the only way to get NRDA funds to purchase the Little Redfish Lake outfall, vote no. It's foolish to think that saving the outfall justifies compromising this pristine portion of the park. Increased day visitors to Little Redfish Lake means increased stress on the eastern portion of the park's native inhabitants, increased trash, increased off-trail impact, and decreased positive park experiences for paying cabin renters and their families. All of this would occur in an area that is not governed as well as the western portion of the park.

We know that South Walton's 30A is a popular and much visited corridor that is experiencing widespread development. This, in turn, has opened up job, tourism, and real estate opportunities, but if we don't balance these opportunities with preservation of natural areas we will lose our uniqueness and our ability to continue to garner tourism and tax dollars. Our dune lakes are a calling card for our area - rare, beautiful, and protected. Little Redfish Lake is tiny and fragile, and if we fail to protect even the smallest of our precious dune lakes by opening up the park to potentially overwhelming day use - shame on us.

Consider leaving the original UMP in place, and adding parking and recreational amenities to the more developed and ranger supervised eastern portion of the park. The TDC could certainly justify funds allocated for these improvements as easily as they could for the western portion of the park. In this win-win situation tourism parking and recreational opportunities would be increased, wildlife would be preserved, cabin renters would continue to enjoy a taste of the real Florida, and Grayton Beach State Park would maintain its reputation as one of the most beautiful and unspoiled parks in the state.

The Bannerman community has great respect for the work your department does in protecting the coastal dune lakes and providing first class public access to those lakes that are spacious enough to accommodate the citizens and visitors to Walton County, however we strongly oppose the introduction of a paddle board launch and boardwalk to Little Redfish Lake, part of which adjoins our community. This unique and rare ecosystem, developed over thousands of years, is simply too small to handle the introduction of what could be many paddle boarders, paddle board festivals etc. Assuming 2 paddle boards per vehicle, the proposed 22 space parking area with two additional ADA spaces could introduce over 40 people into this tiny lake at any one time.

Many of us are avid paddle boarders. There are many larger lakes in the area that we enjoy using, particularly Western Lake, Lake Powell and Choctawhatchee Bay. These larger ecosystems are better able to handle the human element, picnic lunches, trash collection, restrooms, etc.

Little Redfish Lake contains many fresh and salt-water fish, including bream, bass, pan fish, catfish, redfish, flounder, speckled trout and mullet. An eagle nests near the western shoreline and a mature alligator also lives in the lake. Little Redfish Lake and it's serenity is the jewel of our community and we have always been good stewards and guardians over it. Your own literature aptly describes the unique landscape surrounding the lake:

"Embedded within the scrub several small natural communities occur, including depression marshes, mesic and wet flat woods, estuarine unconsolidated substrate and estuarine tidal marsh...[the] scrub community occurring adjacent to beach dunes is significant habitat for Choctawhatchee beach mouse.



Opposition to amendments for the Grayton Beach State Park Plan

While the Gulf Trace Owners Association and the Grayton Beach State Park have long been partners in protecting and preserving the beautiful and rare ecosystems that we share as neighbors, it is with regret that we must inform you that we strongly oppose much of the Division of Recreation and Parks' proposed Unit Plan Amendment of June 2017.

Gulf Trace has established itself as a strong, environmentally sensitive partner with the Park and share the Park's desire to provide increased public access to the area's beaches and believe adding parking spaces near the existing beach boardwalk is a good development; however, we are alarmed by the Park's proposal to allow camping sites with their inevitable fire hazards and the development of Little Redfish Lake that will eventually change the delicate and natural ecosystem of this rare coastal dune lake. Again, we understand people's desire to enjoy the lakes, but there is great pressure in Northwest Florida to continue the recreational sprawl that favors humans over endangered wildlife, rare flower and fauna and the serenity that makes Grayton Beach State Park so special. We would suggest utilizing the existing opportunities in the larger lakes and preserve Little Redfish Lake for future generations of people and animals. We provide three points in our opposition to the proposals.

1) Extreme fire hazard. The northern street of Gulf Trace backs up to the state park. The building of camp sites produce predictable fire hazards which could lead to forest fires that would imperil all homes in Gulf Trace and potentially others. For practical reality, campers often enjoy a campfire along with an alcoholic refreshment. This is a bad combination for the inhabitants of the Park and Gulf Trace and the larger community, particularly during the dry season when winds could easily cause a fire to move very quickly and unpredictably.

Each year, state parks and recreation has cut a fire-break between the park and the houses in Gulf Trace. They have not controlled burned in this area as it is too risky to the homes in the neighborhood. It's clear from this Park practice that the Park recognizes the enormous risk of fire so close to houses. We appreciate there being no burn and submit that it is a known hazard. The Park providing tent camping immediately behind a neighborhood will increase dramatically the likelihood of fire and is completely inconsistent with the Park's own practice of not utilizing a controlled burn by Gulf Trace.

2) Campers needing and wanting access to the beach: The proposed camping sites would be along Forest Dunes Drive and it is foreseen that campers would take the route that would seem the quickest as well as the most logical to access the beach. The access for the public is far removed from the campsites, while the temptation to go the much shorter walk through our private neighborhood would be very strong. It is inevitable that the many of the Park campers would elect to access the roads and homes and yards of Gulf Trace. The owners of GTOA pay for the maintenance and upkeep of all roads, common areas and beach walkovers in Gulf Trace (all of which are not public). The assumption of risk, costs and any other issues cannot and should not be the responsibility of Gulf Trace homeowners.

Why can't the campsites be located away from subdivisions and homes such as ours? Grayton Beach State Park is significant in size and there is plenty of choice other than putting these sites right next to homes.

3) Ecology: Gulf Trace is among a select few areas along 30A that is considered turtle friendly. The homeowners have gone to expense and inconvenience to make this possible. Turtle nests already face decimation by storms, increasing the number of people in this area of the beach certainly poses additional threats. Most visitors do not know nor appreciate how to be turtle friendly...e.g. covering flashlights with colored wrap.

In addition, other wildlife feel the pressure of our human presence. Cars, littering, feeding of the animals...all diminish the ecosystem and safety of the deer, bear, eagles and other fauna. In addition, alligators live in Little Redfish Lake. It would seem only a matter of time that the increased presence of people in this small lake would lead to people and the alligator meeting. Eventually, the alligator will lose to people, but maybe only after someone is injured or worse. This is but a few of the impacts to the delicate ecosystem of which Gulf Trace is a part. And lastly, bathroom facilities. The plan calls for these facilities to be located at least a quarter mile from the campsites.



We are writing to express our strong opposition to the Division of Recreation and Parks' proposed Unit Plan Amendment of June 2017.

We live in Gulf Trace, which is bordered by the Grayton Beach State Park to the west, north and east and by the Gulf of Mexico to the South. We bought our house here in 2008 and the stability of Grayton Beach State Park as a neighbor was a positive factor in our decision, because we never dreamt the Park would do anything inconsistent with the long-term interest of the State Park.

However, we fear your proposed plan is greatly flawed to the point of being dangerous for area homeowners and the beautiful animals and plants that inhabit Grayton Beach State Park.

In order to be brief, we will attempt to concisely share our concerns about the proposed amendment.

- Fire Hazard This is the most dangerous part of your plan. It is inconceivable to us that the Park would invite people to camp with a campfire in the woods immediately adjacent to a neighborhood. As we understand it, the Park now bush hogs rather than conducts a controlled burn because of the obvious risk of burning down houses. This is a prudent and smart practice by the Park, and we are greatly alarmed that guests of the Park would be allowed to have campfires (and surely consume alcohol) in the same Park where your team has decided a controlled burn is a bad idea. And we have our doubts that there would be enough Park Rangers to patrol all this activity. This risk just seems wholly out of sync with the Park's goals and objectives.
- Campers in Gulf Trace We are delighted to have Park guests stay in the cabins in the Park and utilize the Public Beach just to the west of Gulf Trace. This has worked well, and clearly there is ample room on the Public Beach for additional people, so we support your plan to add parking spaces for people to access the beach. However, the location of the campsites next to Forest Dunes Road will inevitably lead to campers walking the much shorter distance through Gulf Trace rather than through the State Park. We don't believe campsites make sense so close to a neighborhood (and the Park has many other areas not near neighborhoods), but really cannot begin to understand why you would locate the campsites right next to a neighborhood and far away from the beach access. This would seem to be inconvenient for your proposed campers and our neighborhood as people would certainly wander through our neighborhood to access the beach through our private streets and beach access.

• Finally, we find the development of Little Redfish Lake as one more environmental loss in a highly popular tourist destination that seems to have an insatiable appetite for more land, bigger buildings, more people and less natural habitat. This is clearly a defeat for preservation and conservation. If people want to paddleboat or canoe, have them go to the larger lakes in the Park rather than disturb this small coastal dune lake. A local herd of deer. My grand kids leap up in the morning so we can get an early look at the deer walking across the road to access Alligator

Lake. There are black bears that traverse the forest to avoid people, but if you are early and quiet you can see them.

Each species you eliminate by virtue of placing human habitation structures in place begins the slow decline of the web of species that depend Upon it.

I highly recommend that you find a new plan to expand public access.

Re: Proposed infrastructure development at Grayton Beach State Park

#### Dear Mr. Clark:

Audubon was concerned to learn of a proposal to add additional recreational infrastructure to the western unit of Grayton Beach State Park, which will be the subject of a public meeting in Walton County this evening. We understand that this infrastructure is proposed to be funded by Walton County to provide additional public access and as a companion to the proposed NRDA acquisition of seven acres of beach frontage around the adjacent outfall of Little Redfish Lake.

While the acquisition would make a nice addition to Grayton Beach State Park, it is not appropriate to develop this infrastructure on the western unit of the park.

The western unit of Grayton Beach State Park represents some of the last, quality coastal scrub in Walton County. Much of this habitat type has been converted to housing in the region, and the habitat on this parcel warrants protection on behalf of all Floridians for whom it is held in trust.

In addition to the direct footprint of the infrastructure, the proposed level of recreational use will be challenging for the limited park staff to manage from their location at the main entrance unit of the park. Without onsite staffing, use is likely to exceed projections and come at the expense of the site's resources.

The park's unit management plan never identified this unit as a good candidate for additional recreational development—in part because of its ecological value and in part because of its management challenges. There are many recreational improvements already recommended for the main entrance unit of the park in the existing Unit Management Plan (UMP). If recreational improvements are necessary to justify the use of NRDA recreational use funds on the dune outfall acquisition, then the improvements should be made in accordance with the existing UMP at the main entrance unit of the park.

While we are sympathetic to Walton County's desire to increase coastal public access, Grayton Beach State Park's western unit is serving an important public purpose by protecting this important habitat and low impact public experience. Audubon does not support the proposed expansion of recreational infrastructure in the western unit, and encourages DEP to invest instead in implementing the recreational elements already identified in the Grayton Beach State Park UMP at the main entrance.
