This is a few commits in regards to the Park Service meeting that was held on 8-7-18 and the proposed improvements to the park.

My main concern is actually a lack of any Battlefield interpretive signage.

This has been a issue with this park for many years.

All the Civil War Battlefields that I have been to have great interpretive signage that included full size replica cannons to mark the spots where the artillery cannons/batteries were located and what units they belonged to.

There is no such thing at Natural Bridge.

Also there is no markers for Infantry or Calvary units that mark there positions on the battlefield.

In fact there is not even a battlefield map of the actual battlefield posted at lest I have not seen such a map posted but have seen them posted on the internet.

Civil War tourism is a multi-million dollar industry and we are missing out on those visitors and their dollars because there is no interpretive trail or any signage on the actual battlefield. All cannon positions must be located and marked with full size replicas of the actual cannons that were on the field at the battle and plaques placed to identity what units were where at the time of the battle.

Greetings,

I have read the proposed management plan for the Horn Springs Property and have some misgivings about the plan's lack of information/ambiguity regarding whether swimming will be allowed in Horn Spring itself. I am an avid spring-goer myself and would be very disappointed if swimming was to be prohibited at the spring.

Having paddled to the spring myself multiple times before the state bought the land, I am reasonably confident that the size of the spring lends itself to allowing users to wade and swim. I think a very apt comparison for Horn Spring is Pitt Spring in Bay County, where swimming is very much encouraged; the water management district did an excellent job of creating steps down to the spring to limit trampling of the bank and subsequent erosion without marring the natural aesthetic of the site. I think similar improvements at Horn Spring would be invaluable in offering a resource protection friendly way to facilitate visitors getting in and out of the water.

I think people are going to find a way to swim here whether it's allowed or not, like they do at Cherokee Sink, and not taking the into account would be foolish and shortsighted. While I agree that access should be limited at smaller, more fragile springs on the property, I think giving access at Horn Springs to swimmers would go a long way to make the park a valuable recreation asset in Leon County. I hope you take my considerations seriously, and I am looking forward to receiving your response.

The purpose of this meeting is to receive public input on the proposed management plan amendment for the Horn Springs Addition to Natural Bridge Battlefield Historic . State Park.

Background

The Horn Springs Addition, is the site of 10 known springs and important historic sites. At nearly 2,000 acres in size this valuable addition to the Florida Park Service will offer visitors the opportunity to explore and interact with an exemplary natural setting. Improvements
