#### A. FCT # 20-004-FF21 Gladys E. Douglas Preserve Acquisition

Gladys E. Douglas Preserve Acquisition, a joint project by The City of Dunedin and Pinellas County, was provided FCT funding in the amount of \$2,400,000 for the preservation of 44 acres for conservation and passive recreation and an additional \$1,500,000 via Legislative assistance for the acquisition of a 14.84-acre conservation easement. The site is located within an Urban Service Area that will connect the surrounding neighborhoods and greenways to new park access. The Florida Natural Areas Inventory considered the site to be a Locally Significant Natural Area due to the presence of several rare species of habitat in a small area, designated as a rosemary bald area and sand pine scrub area. Recreational developments that are proposed include various trail types, observational viewing elements, educational elements, and opportunities for fishing and canoe/kayaking. In addition to establishing open space and supporting the preservation and restoration of natural habitat communities, the project also commits to furthering comprehensive plan directives that include the enhancement of surface water quality with stormwater management elements.










#### B. FCT # 20-001-FF21 Jumping Gully Preserve Phase II

Jumping Gully Preserve Phase II, a project by Pasco County, was provided FCT funding in the amount of \$1,028,665 for the preservation of 318 acres for conservation and passive recreation. The site is in Spring Hill and serves to build on the original nearly 600-acre Jumping Gully Preserve Phase I project that was funded by FCT in 2013. The Florida Natural Areas Inventory considered the site to be a Locally Significant Natural Area due to the presence of habitat suitable for several rare species and over 25% of the project site is in a Strategic Habitat Conservation Area, as identified by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. Recreational developments that are proposed include various trail types, educational elements, and opportunities for picnicking, geocaching, and camping. In addition to establishing open space and supporting the preservation and enhancement of natural communities, the project is required to be managed as an ecological corridor. The acquisition of this site completed Pasco County's designated North Pasco to Crossbar Ecological Corridor, an uninterrupted stretch of over 1,700 acres for wildlife to thrive and the public to enjoy.









#### C. FCT # 18-014-FF19 Quay Bayside Acquisition

Quay Bayside Acquisition, submitted by the City of Marathon in 2018, was awarded funding in 2023 due to a rolldown in funds from the 2019 cycle. After working with the grantee through the early acquisition phase, including receiving and reviewing due diligence documents, the Marathon City Council subsequently approved a new design for the project that included installation of two public boat ramps with a fee structure for launching and parking for non-residents and fee-free use for Marathon residents.

It was the determination of the Trust, in close consultation with our Office of General Counsel, that the fee structure put in place was inconsistent with our policy for non-resident fees on sites receiving state financial assistance. It was considering this change in direction initiated by the city that both parties mutually accepted there was not a viable path to move forward with the State's grant funding award to partially reimburse the City of Marathon's purchase of this site.

As such the Grant Agreement was terminated by FCT on July 9, 2024. The funds allocated for this project amounted to \$844,800. Those funds will now become available for the FF24 cycle.

#### D. Region, I Workshop, Northwest Florida

The workshop in Region I's, Northwest Florida, was the first of three regional workshops to be held throughout the state that feature different FCT topics during each workshop. FCT staff hosted the first workshop in Panama City, FL, City Hall on Wednesday, June 26, 2024. The meeting began at 10 a.m. CT and had in-person and virtual attendees. Staff was able to collaborate with Panama City's City Hall staff in securing a meeting space within their building. All FCT staff members were in attendance to provide these presentations and on-site technical support for our grantees. This first workshop focused on FCT's requirements for stewardship reports, annual revenue reports, transition requirements for the 5-year reporting cycle, and the importance of staff site visits.

Northwest Florida currently has 57 FCT project sites in this area of the state and we were excited to work with our grantees on stewardship, compliance, and any challenges they were facing due to local funding issues or recent weather events that may be preventing them from reaching 100% completion at their respective project site.

The workshop itinerary included information about annual stewardship responsibilities at their project sites, the required revenue report due annually by July 31, and opportunities of the sites at 100% completion to transition to 5-year stewardship reporting. FCT staff included educational information on program requirements, guidelines and responsibilities, and the importance of staff site visits to ensure compliance at all FCT project sites.

Our third workshop is scheduled for Spring of 2025 in the Southwest region of the State. ### ITEM 6. Final Approval of the FCT Parks and Open Space 2024 Priority Ranking List

#### Proposed Changes to the Preliminary Priority List Approved on February 13, 2024

#### Changes to Acquisition Types:

The acquisition type changed from Reimbursement to Pre-Acquired for two projects:

- 23-008-FF24, Athletic Complex Expansion, Village of Palm Springs was acquired on January 31, 2024.
- 23-010-FF24, Crooked River Preserve, Manatee County, was acquired on February 12, 2024.

Both changes are denoted by an asterisk (\*) accompanied by a note at the bottom of the Final Priority Funding List.

#### Available Funding

The funds reverted to the program with the termination of the Quay Bayside project amounted to \$844,800. Those funds will now become available for the FF24 cycle and will allow for the 2024 Ravenswood Park Land acquisition (#23-012-FF24) to be 100% funded as shown on the priority funding list spreadsheet.

#### Changes to Preliminary Scores based on Site Visit Verification

FCT Staff conducted site visits pursuant to Rule 62-818.009(1). The purpose of the site visits was to confirm facts and conclusions made via the evaluation of each eligible application. One project dropped in their preliminary score based upon observations made during the site visits.

Project #23-008-FF24, Athletic Complex Expansion, Village of Palm Springs, received a preliminary score of 120 points. Criterion (2)(a)(1)b requires a functional trail at least one-half-mile in length. The project was awarded 5 points for this criterion.



FCT Staff observed during the site visit of March 28, 2024, that the trail as depicted in the Conceptual Site Plan was significantly less than one half-mile in length. Additional research conducted after the conclusion of the site visit found the trail to only measure approximately 355 feet in length (*image below*), compared to the 2,640 feet needed to receive full points. The new preliminary score for the project is 115 points. The project did not drop in rank as a result of this reduction in points. The following map reflects the measurement of the proposed trail on the project site.



#### Changes to Preliminary Scores based on conceptual site plan map

Project, #23-011-FF24, San Sebastian Boat Ramp in St. Johns County, received an original score of 150 points. The grantee notified FCT Staff of proposed changes to the conceptual site plan. This new site plan includes several parking pads to accommodate boats and trailers on the project site. It also requires permits for roadway access, dredging, and a boat harbor and ramp which has resulted in a change from the original passive recreation site plan for this project. Based on the revised conceptual site plan, the application evaluation was rescored and now reflects a reduction of 15 points. As noted on the updated Priority Funding List, the new score for the San Sebastian Boat Ramp is 135 points and has moved the project to number two on the priority funding list.
