### LAND AND RECREATION GRANTS SECTION INTRODUCTION

#### Land and Recreation Grants Section

The Land and Recreation Grants Section (LRGS) promotes and fosters partnerships to enhance and sustain Florida's natural and cultural resources and provide increased outdoor recreational opportunities for Florida residents and visitors. Housed within the Division of State Lands, LRGS administers state and federally funded grants, including:

- Florida Communities Trust (FCT)
- Florida Recreation Development Assistance Program (FRDAP)
- Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF)
  - Outdoor Recreation Legacy Partnership (ORLP) Program
  - Readiness and Recreation Initiative Grant Program (LWCF + REPI)
- Recreational Trails Program (RTP)


These competitive grant programs provide funding assistance for the acquisition of recreation, conservation, and working waterfront properties, and the development of public recreational facilities. 


## LAND AND RECREATION GRANTS SECTION LAND AND WATER CONSERVATION FUND

#### Land and Water Conservation Fund

The Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) Program is a competitive, federal program authorized by Congress that provides for the acquisition or development of land for public outdoor recreation. LWCF funds are appropriated by Congress to the U. S. Department of the Interior, National Parks Service (NPS), and NPS allocates the funds through state agencies as a grant program to state and local governments. It is administered at the state level by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection.

<u>Rule Chapter 62D-5, F.A.C.</u> outlines all of the rules that govern the LWCF. It is a great resource of programmatic information, including general requirements, application requirements and processing, application evaluation criteria, grant administration, and compliance responsibilities.

## LAND AND RECREATION GRANTS SECTION LAND AND WATER CONSERVATION FUND

### **LWCF Application Information**

Eligible applicants include county governments and incorporated municipalities of the state of Florida and other legally constituted local governmental entities with the legal responsibility for the provision of outdoor recreational sites and facilities for the use and benefit of the general public.

Grant thresholds are established annually, and dependent upon funding allocation by the NPS. Project sponsors are required to meet a 1:1 match ratio.

Applicants must have and demonstrate adequate site control of project sites and are able to construct, operate, and maintain the area for the period of time sufficient to satisfy the dedication period as required <u>62D-5, F.A.C.</u> and the <u>LWCF Program Manual</u>.

Permissible uses of funds include the acquisition of land and waters, or public access to them, for recreational purposes, the development of outdoor recreation and supporting facilities, or a combination of both categories.

## LAND AND RECREATION GRANTS SECTION READINESS AND ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION INTEGRATION

#### **Readiness and Environmental Protection Integration**

The Department of Defense's (DOD) Readiness and Environmental Protection Integration (REPI) Program preserves military missions by supporting cost-sharing agreements between the Military Services, other federal agencies, state and local governments, and private conservation organizations to avoid land use conflicts near military installations, address environmental restrictions that limit military activities, and increase resilience to climate change.

The REPI Program is administered by the Office of the Secretary of Defense (OSD).

Since FY 2003, DOD has secured \$1.24 billion with over \$1.13 billion in non-Department partner contributions to protect over 1.18 million acres of land at 120 locations across 35 states and territories to preserve key operational assets, infrastructure, and capabilities.

# Authorities

The REPI Program supports partnerships per 10 U.S.C. §2684a, which authorizes agreements between the Military Services, private conservation groups, and state and local governments to acquire real property interests –as well as per authorities of the Sikes Act (16 U.S.C. §670 c-1) and IGSA (10 U.S.C. §2679)

# REPI Projects

Office of Secretary Defense (OSD) manages REPI encroachment management partnerships as an internal-DOD Program, issuing guidance and providing funding to the Services for REPI projects

Services implement projects, including projects that are funded only with Service O&M funds (not REPI Program funds)

Source of Funding

National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) line item to fund implementation of the partnerships authorized by 10 U.S.C. §2684a, as well as projects and activities executed under Sikes Act (16 U.S.C. §670 c-1) and IGSA (10 U.S.C. §2679) Authorities



## LAND AND RECREATION GRANTS SECTION READINESS AND ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION INTEGRATION

#### **Readiness and Environmental Protection Integration**

Florida is home to 20 major military installations, 3 of 10 unified combatant commands, and the military's only east coast space launch facility. In addition, it hosts 2 of only 4 Navy deep water ports in the country with adjacent airfields, 1 of only 3 Navy Fleet Readiness Centers, and the Marine Corps' only maritime prepositioning force facility.

Through FY 2022, DOD and its partners have spent nearly \$228 million on REPI projects at 11 installations in Florida.

# READINESS AND RECREATION INITIATIVE GRANT PROGRAM (LWCF + REPI)



#### **Readiness and Recreation Initiative Grant Program**

The Department of Defense and the Department of the Interior have joined forces to preserve land around military installations and improve access to outdoor recreation for millions of Americans and defense communities.

Through the new Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) State Assistance + Readiness and Environmental Protection Integration (REPI) Partnership Challenge Program, known as the **Readiness and Recreation Initiative Grant Program**, DOI's National Park Service will provide \$40 million in funding from unobligated LWCF Program balances to safeguard natural areas, protect water resources, preserve cultural heritage sites, and provide recreation opportunities for the public. The REPI Program will provide a matching \$40 million in funds to support projects within an existing REPI agreement area.

Authorized by Congress, the program provides for the acquisition or acquisition and development of compatible recreation facilities on public lands within a REPI Partnership Agreement area.

### **Readiness and Recreation Initiative Grant Program**

FY2023-2024 LWCF + REPI Grant Application Cycle

Applicants must submit one (1 original) of the completed application and all supporting documents during the announced submission. **Use a soft covered binder, not a HARD 3-ring binder.** All supporting documents or attachments must be clearly tabbed according to the application instruction checklist provided for both the State and Federal portions of the grant application.

#### The Readiness and Recreation Initiative Grant Program Application Cycle does not provide for a deficiency period.

Each eligible application shall be evaluated on the basis of the information provided in accordance with the original application, LWCF program rule and the National Park Service's <u>Notice of Funding</u> <u>Opportunity (NOFO) P23AS00318</u>. Applications submitted without all required State and Federal documentation will be marked as incomplete and will not be eligible to compete for funding.

### **Eligible Applicants**

Eligible applicants include state agencies and local units of government (e.g., state political subdivisions such as cities, counties, and special purpose districts such as park districts).

Applicants must demonstrate that they are party to an active REPI Partnership Agreement or partnered with a nonprofit organization included in the <u>REPI Program Partners</u> that is party to an active REPI Partnership Agreement.

Project sponsors are limited to **one (1) application** per eligible applicant for the FY2023-2024 LWCF + REPI Application Cycle.






### LAND AND RECREATION GRANTS SECTION FY2023-2024 LWCF + REPI GRANT APPLICATION CYCLE: ELIGIBILITY

#### **Eligible Projects**

Land acquisition only or acquisition with compatible recreation development (aka, "combination") projects that meet a priority outdoor recreation need or goal as identified in the Florida's SCORP as well as that of the project sponsor, and that will provide compatible land use within the REPI Program Area.

Projects must create or expand public outdoor recreational opportunities for the general public, including for nearby residents and military families associated with the military installation within the REPI Program Area. They should promote compatible land uses for military installations within REPI Program Areas, particularly land uses related to compatible recreation development, advancing conservation or climate resilience (only if offering compatible public access), and related uses. Proposed projects must advance the goals of an active REPI Partnership.





### LAND AND RECREATION GRANTS SECTION FY2023-2024 LWCF + REPI GRANT APPLICATION CYCLE: ELIGIBILITY

#### **Eligible Project Site(s)**

Successful proposals will be located within an active REPI Program Area or in an area where there is active interest in establishing a new REPI Program Area (areas within the vicinity of, or ecologically related to, a military installation or military airspace).

Eligible project sites must promote compatible land uses for military installations within REPI Program Areas, particularly land uses related to compatible recreation development, advancing conservation or climate resilience (only if offering compatible public access), and related uses.



FY2023-2024 LWCF + REPI Grant Application

The State of Florida's Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) grant application, DRP-121, became effective on August 7, 2023. For the purpose of the Readiness and Recreation Initiative Grant Program, this form has been modified to meet LWCF + REPI funding specific criteria.

The application is twenty-eight (28) pages, of which the initial nineteen (19) are fillable.

The FY2023-2024 Readiness and Recreation Initiative Grant Program Application Cycle does not provide for a deficiency period. Incomplete applications submitted with missing information will not be eligible to compete for funding.

The initial page of the application requests information on the project sponsor, including:

### Part I – General Information C. Financial Information, pages 4 & 5

Continuing with the general information segment, pages four (4) and five (5) request information regarding the project proposal's budget. Applicants should provide the land purchase prices and the development costs to determine the total project cost.

The LWCF Act specifically excludes acquisition support costs from eligibility (see 54 U.S.C. 200305(e)(2)(A)) so such costs should not be proposed to be part of the grant share or to meet the match share.

LWCF funds requested cannot exceed \$5,000,000. A matching share meeting the 1:1 minimum requirement must be secured or firmly committed at the time of application. It must be supported by a signed letter from the REPI partner, confirming the type (cash or in-kind) and amount or value of the contribution.

Letter(s) of Support Documenting Secured Contributions of Matching Share must be included as Attachment N15.



The following segment of the application covers the project tasks, deliverables and required documentation for reimbursement.

List all elements for development on the site, as well as the project's acquisition costs. The LWCF Act requires that any park or other outdoor recreation area benefiting from assistance from the LWCF through the LWCF + REPI funding opportunity, whether for acquisition or acquisition and development purposes, provide a plan for site development.

For this segment, an attachment a copy of the discussed materials must be included as "Attachment A". *Responses must pertain to the development portion of the project.* 

If the project has been identified in the CIP, sponsors must provide:

- 1. A letter from the agency's city or county manager certifying the five-year capital improvement schedule is officially adopted and date adopted.
- 2. A copy of the five-year Capital Improvement Schedule included in the applicant's adopted Local Comprehensive Plan, stating project by name, amount and year.

If the project identified as part of the plan through an adopted resolution committing the applicant to amend their CIP, sponsors must provide:

1. A copy of a fully executed resolution amending the existing schedule to include the development of the proposed project. The resolution must clearly indicate the development of the proposed project by name, year and amount, and cannot be older than 3 years.

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

Part II – Evaluation Criteria, continues page 10, beginning with the State Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (SCORP).

**Section 2A**: Applicants must explain how the proposed project would address one or more of the issues, recommendations or goals identified in the State Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan. Use the <u>OUTDOOR RECREATION IN FLORIDA – Current</u> <u>SCORP (Chapter 5)</u>. Provide quotations or other appropriate references with explanations to justify the correlation.

**Section 2B**: Project applicants must locate their region and circle each priority resource/facility need as proposed in the project. These elements must match those listed within the budget information on pages 7 & 8 of this application.





#### Part II – Evaluation Criteria A. General Criteria, 3. Public Participation, page 12

Page 21 of the application requests information regarding public participation for the proposed project. To receive points for this section, any meetings, presentations, or surveys *must be held in the current year or within the previous 3 years of application*. Each of the three meetings must be held separately to receive each set of points. Meetings also must be held prior to the application submittal.

**3A. Sole-purpose Meeting:** Demonstrate that a pre-advertised public meeting was held <u>solely</u> for the purpose of discussing the proposed project.

• Attach a copy of the ad and proof of publication for the advertisement. Advertisement needs to state where and when advertised.

**3B. Regularly Scheduled Meeting:** Demonstrate that the project was discussed at a regularly scheduled meeting of the applicant's advisory board responsible for park, recreation and leisure service activities. City or County Commissions are not considered advisory boards. The board must be an appointed group of citizens, such as a parks and recreation advisory board, who would normally review projects similar to the proposed grant application. Planning and Zoning or similar boards may be used if a parks and recreation advisory board does not exist.

• Provide a copy of the minutes of the advisory board meeting(s) where this project was discussed.



Detail Narrative (2-page limit): Provide the following information:




