They are shy creatures that spend their time in the shadows of plants located on the outer edge of the spring. get their name from the mirror-like scales, which reflect the sun's rays as it filters through the clear spring water. They are small fish that live in large groups and prefer quiet waters. REPTILES AND AMPHIBIANS _____ can be seen basking in the sun along spring-fed river banks. They are the largest reptile in North America and can reach a length of up to 12 feet! That's the same length as 40 crayons lined up from top to bottom! is almost never found outside of Florida's springs. They "breathe" by absorbing oxygen through their skin! These small creatures can grow to a maximum length of only five inches. That's even shorter than the length of a dollar bill! BIRDS AND MAMMALS ____ is one of the most common birds you will see near a spring. These birds are about 4 feet tall (are you taller or shorter?) and are often seen hunting for fish, frogs and snakes. Have you ever seen a slip into the water alongside a spring fed river? They are often hard to spot but commonly make their den in a bank or log near a Florida spring. They love to chow down on small fish and crustaceans (freshwater shrimp, spring crayfish). **PLANTS** , found in rivers that flow from Florida springs, is an underwater plant with ribbon-like leaves. Damselflies, snails and fish love spending time in and around it. are huge, majestic trees that can grow up to 150 feet tall with trunks measuring 12 feet across. Their knobby roots can be seen coming up out of shallow water and are called "knees." They have a long life-span and can live for over 1,000 years.
