The Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings House and Farmyard is nationally significant in the area of literature as the home of Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings, a leading twentieth-century American writer whose works continue to interest scholars, students, and the general reading public. In 2006, Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings Historic State Park was designated a National Historic Landmark, the highest such recognition accorded to historic properties determined to be of exceptional value in representing or illustrating an important theme, event, or person in the history of the nation.

Acquisition: Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings Historic State Park was initially acquired on July 1, 1970. The original 0.76-acre parcel was acquired from the University of Florida Foundation, Inc. (UFF), under a ten-year lease.

Optimum Boundary

Parcels totaling approximately 52 acres to the north of the park on the east side of County Road 325 have been identified as desirable for acquisition. The addition of this land will ensure the continuation of a rural setting around the historic Rawlings homestead. This optimum boundary will also provide a buffer from future surrounding private development and expand the potential for public interpretation of the site. At this time there are no lands considered surplus to the management needs of the park.
