Statutory Authority:

Section 20.2551, F.S., Citizen support organizations; use of property; audit; public records; partnerships. In summary, the statute specifies the organizational requirements, operational parameters, duties of a CSO to support the Department of Environmental Protection (Department), or individual units of the Department, use of Department property, audit requirements, public records requirements, and authorizes public-private partnerships to enhance lands managed by the Department.

Section 258.015, F.S., Citizen support organizations; use of property; audit. In summary, the statute defines a CSO, requires authorization by the Division of Recreation and Parks, and specifies the use of property. This statute authorizes the Partnerships in Parks (PIP) program for state parks, the program's operational parameters, CSO's operational parameters, and donor recognition.

Brief Description of the CSO's Mission:

The Friends of Maclay Gardens, Inc. (Friends) enhances, preserves, supports, and promotes the physical, cultural, recreational and horticultural features of Maclay Gardens.

Brief Description of the CSO's Results Obtained:

The Friends have sponsored the Tour of Gardens event for the past 20 years. This is an event where local residents open their gardens for public viewing. Recent years have generated over \$18,000 for the park. In the past several years, the Friends have sponsored a Jazz concert in the fall, bringing in hundreds of visitors. The Friends have also purchased property on the Park border to provide a buffer to the park as well as to allow for future growth. In addition to providing financial support to the Park and its mission, the entire Board has been donating their time and expertise.

Brief Description of the CSO's Plans for Next Three Fiscal Years:

The Friends will continue to provide financial support through its annual fundraising events. These funds will be used to purchase plants, materials, and landscape items (i.e. benches, sprinkler systems, etc.) to further enhance the Park. The Friends will actively work to secure an income stream and strengthen the CSO's community ties in order to insure the long term success of the Friends of Maclay Gardens, Inc.

Friends of Maclay Gardens, Inc. CODE OF ETHICS

PREAMBLE

- (1) It is essential to the proper conduct and operation of Friends of Maclay Gardens, Inc., (herein "CSO") that its board members, officers, and employees be independent and impartial and that their position not be used for private gain. Therefore, the Florida Legislature in Section 112.3251, Florida Statute (Fla. Stat.), requires that the law protect against any conflict of interest and establish standards for the conduct of CSO board members, officers, and employees in situations where conflicts may exist.
- (2) It is hereby declared to be the policy of the state that no CSO board member, officer, or employee shall have any interest, financial or otherwise, direct or indirect, or incur any obligation of any nature which is in substantial conflict with the proper discharge of his or her duties for the CSO. To implement this policy and strengthen the faith and confidence of the people in Citizen Support Organizations, there is enacted a code of ethics setting forth standards of conduct required of Friends of Maclay Gardens, Inc. board members, officers, and employees in the performance of their official duties.

STANDARDS

The following standards of conduct are enumerated in Chapter 112, Fla. Stat., and are required by Section 112.3251, Fla. Stat., to be observed by CSO board members, officers, and employees.

1. Prohibition of Solicitation or Acceptance of Gifts

No CSO board member, officer, or employee shall solicit or accept anything of value to the recipient, including a gift, loan, reward, promise of future employment, favor, or service, based upon any understanding that the vote, official action, or judgment of the CSO board member, officer, or employee would be influenced thereby.

2. Prohibition of Accepting Compensation Given to Influence a Vote

No CSO board member, officer, or employee shall accept any compensation, payment, or thing of value when the person knows, or, with reasonable care, should know that it was given to influence a vote or other action in which the CSO board member, officer, or employee was expected to participate in his or her official capacity.

3. Salary and Expenses

No CSO board member or officer shall be prohibited from voting on a matter affecting his or her salary, expenses, or other compensation as a CSO board member or officer, as provided by law.

4. Prohibition of Misuse of Position

A CSO board member, officer, or employee shall not corruptly use or attempt to use one's official position or any property or resource which may be within one's trust, or perform official duties, to secure a special privilege, benefit, or exemption.

5. Prohibition of Misuse of Privileged Information

No CSO board member, officer, or employee shall disclose or use information not available to members of the general public and gained by reason of one's official position for one's own personal gain or benefit or for the personal gain or benefit of any other person or business entity.

6. Post-Office/Employment Restrictions

A person who has been elected to any CSO board or office or who is employed by a CSO may not personally represent another person or entity for compensation before the governing body of the CSO of which he or she was a board member, officer, or employee for a period of two years after he or she vacates that office or employment position.

7. Prohibition of Employees Holding Office

No person may be, at one time, both a CSO employee and a CSO board member at the same time.

8. Requirements to Abstain From Voting

A CSO board member or officer shall not vote in official capacity upon any measure which would affect his or her special private gain or loss, or which he or she knows would affect the special gain or any principal by whom the board member or officer is retained. When abstaining, the CSO board member or officer, prior to the vote being taken, shall make every reasonable effort to disclose the nature of his or her interest as a public record in a memorandum filed with the person responsible for recording the minutes of the meeting, who shall incorporate the memorandum in the minutes. If it is not possible for the CSO board member or officer to file a memorandum before the vote, the memorandum must be filed with the person responsible for recording the minutes of the meeting no later than 15 days after the vote.

9. Failure to Observe CSO Code of Ethics

Failure of a CSO board member, officer, or employee to observe the Code of Ethics may result in the removal of that person from their position. Further, failure of the CSO to observe the Code of Ethics may result in the Florida Department of Environmental Protection terminating its Agreement with the CSO.

Financial Disclosure Statement for the year ended 12/31/2013

(1) Organization

The Friends of Maclay Gardens, Inc. (the Friends) is a not for profit organization incorporated under the laws of the State of Florida and is a tax exempt organization under the Internal Revenue Code. A copy of the official registration and financial information is attached. Registration does not imply endorsement, approval or recommendations by the State.

The Friends is funded primarily from contributions made by the members of the organization, within the State of Florida, as well as through special events held as fundraisers. These contributions are used to fund various projects and goods for support of the Alfred B. Maclay Gardens State Park.

(2) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(A) Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting. Under this method, the revenues are recognized when collected rather than when earned, and expenses are recognized when paid rather than when incurred. This basic approach is modified to include value of contributed services, and fixed assets and related depreciation or equity. The Friends have no employees and therefore no employee payroll. The Friends does not maintain inventory for resale purposes. No goods are sold, therefore no sales taxes are collected or reported.

(B) Basis of Presentation

Net Assets and revenues and expenses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, the net assets of the Friends and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Unrestricted Net Assets - All revenues collected from membership fees and fund-raising activities Temporarily Restricted Net Assets - None Permanently Restricted Net Assets - Land purchase on Maclay Road (C) Present CSO financial policies: Financial policies are on file to detail cash-handling procedures. Revenues collected for membership in the Friends are considered to be donations to the Friends. Tickets for attendance to special events are considered as donations, as well as collections for silent auction items.

- Provided financial and volunteer assistance for programs and workshops presented by the park including: Kids Fishing Day, Literacy Events, Camellia Christmas and other programs presented for educational and recreational purposes
- Sponsored and presented special events to raise funds and increase public awareness of the park, including the annual Tour of Gardens, now in its 20th year, Moon Over Maclay (Jazz concert), an annual community scarecrow exhibit, and a Summer Arts Festival. All of these saw an increase in income and attendance
- Purchasing property adjacent to the park on Maclay Road to provide a secondary access road into and out of the park, important to the safety of park visitors and personnel
- Continued to promote the endowment fund established in 2012 with the Community Foundation of North Florida
- Provided landscaping design and installation assistance for the park entrance areas and continued to provide replacement plants in all areas of the historic Gardens
