## **Proposed Florida Greenways and Trails Designation**

**Project Name:** Ocheesee Pond Paddling Trail

**Project Description:** Ocheesee Pond offers a unique recreational opportunity for paddlers in that the proposed 5.2-mile loop paddling trail is largely through a scenic cypress swamp. Only the southern end of the pond would be considered open water. The Jackson County Parks and Recreation Department has marked an easy follow trail with yellow blazes and OGT staff assisted by making a GPS track for the attached maps. The proposed paddling trail provides a wealth of recreational, environmental, economic and educational opportunities. Recreation uses include kayaking, canoeing, stand up paddleboard, fishing, boating, duck hunting and wildlife viewing. The pond is home to a vast array of birds, mammals and aquatic life. The pond was also the place where a supposed skunk ape was captured in 1884. The documented case turned out to be a wild man "entirely destitute of clothing, emaciated, and covered with a phenomenal growth of hair." <a href="http://www.exploresouthernhistory.com/ocheeseewildman.html">http://www.exploresouthernhistory.com/ocheeseewildman.html</a>.

Ocheesee Pond is easy to reach in that it is just north of Interstate 10 south of Sneads (Exit 158, then north on CR 286 for 1.9 miles, left on CR 280 for 2.8 miles, and then right on Arkansas Road and follow .3 mile to <u>county boat ramp</u>). Three Rivers State Park is about 9 miles north of the pond and offers public camping opportunities.

**Public Access:** Ocheesee Pond has one public access site near the southern end of the pond, an improved boat ramp, which is managed by Jackson County.

## **FGTS Plan Status**

**Opportunity Trail Network:** Ocheesee Pond is identified as a Florida Greenways and Trails System opportunity paddling trail.

**Staff Recommendation:** The Division of Recreation and Parks, Office of Greenways and Trails recommends approval of this designation.
