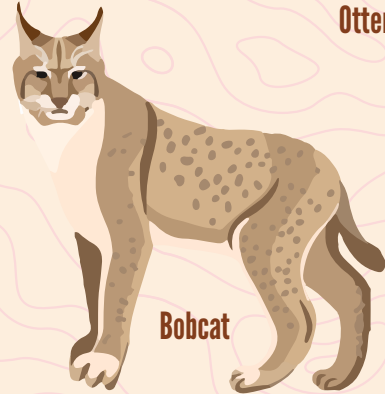

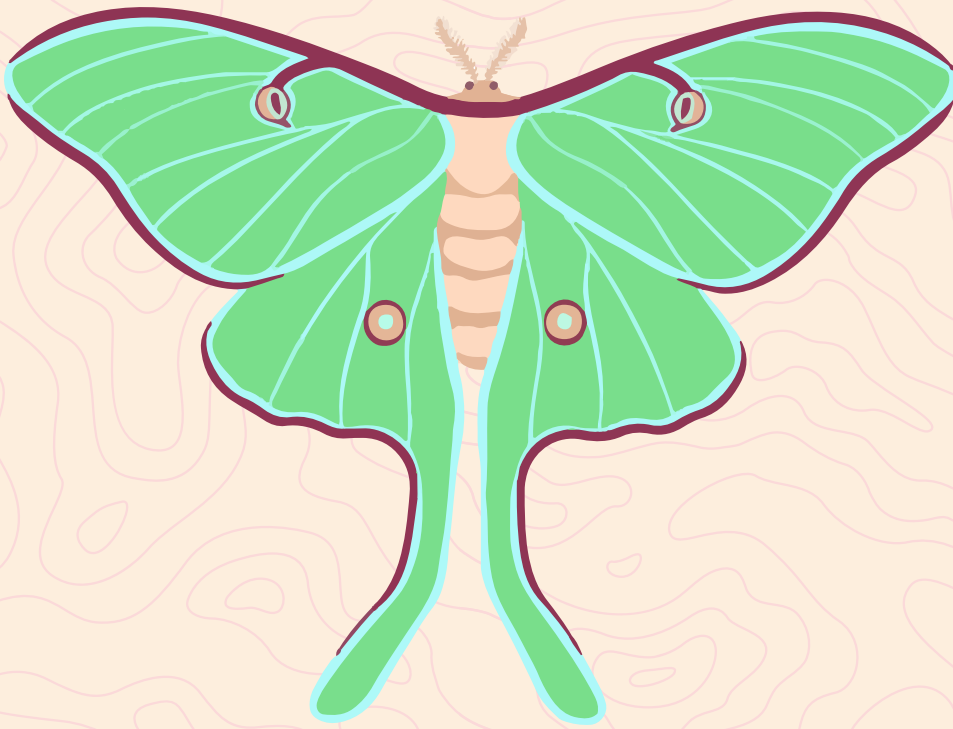

Florida's wildlife includes mammals like armadillos, black bears and panthers; reptiles such as alligators, turtles and snakes. Can you identify these wildlife tracks? Who knows, you might even find these tracks in the wild!

Head outdoors and look for these insects! Check them off as you find them.



The luna moth, which is unique to North America, begins its life as an extremely hungry caterpillar. This caterpillar feeds on the leaves of paper birch, walnut, hickory and sweet gum trees after hatching. The caterpillar constructs a cocoon after eating for almost a month. After spending three weeks inside the cocoon, the luna moth will emerge.



Luna Moth

Great blue skimmers prefer shady, shallow and still water rather than open sunny wetlands. They are not as aggressive as other skimmers, and you can usually spot them in a puddle after a summer rain. Both male and female skimmers have a white face and blue eyes yet differ in body color.



Great Blue Skimmer

This hoverfly likes flowers and looks like a bee, but can't sting! It mimics bees and wasps to avoid being eaten. Most have yellow and black stripes.



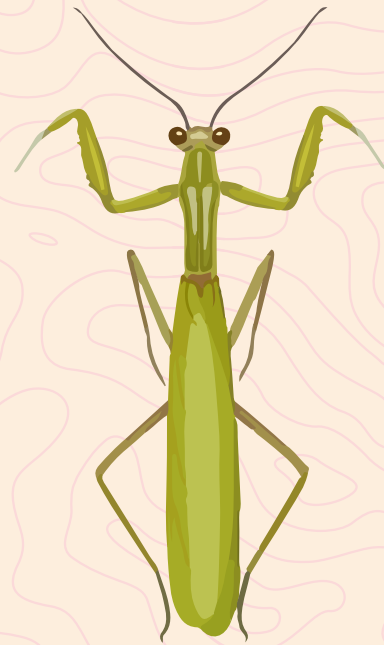

As carnivores, a praying mantis' diet consists of insects and other small animals, like frogs and lizards. The praying mantis will blend in with its environment to catch its prey off guard. They are great hunters and are helpful in keeping pests away.

These are eating machines, can grow up to 1.5 inches. When in danger, the caterpillar raises its orange horn-like gland, releasing a stinky smell. They molt, or shed their skin, five times. Their colors change as they grow. Many spend the winter season as pupae, before finishing their transformation into butterflies in the spring.

All tiger beetles are predators. They are known for their aggression and running speed. The fastest species of tiger beetle can run at a speed of 5.6 mph. They have powerful jaws, called mandibles, which they use to hold and crush their prey. They have long legs, big eyes and a wide head. All are colorful.

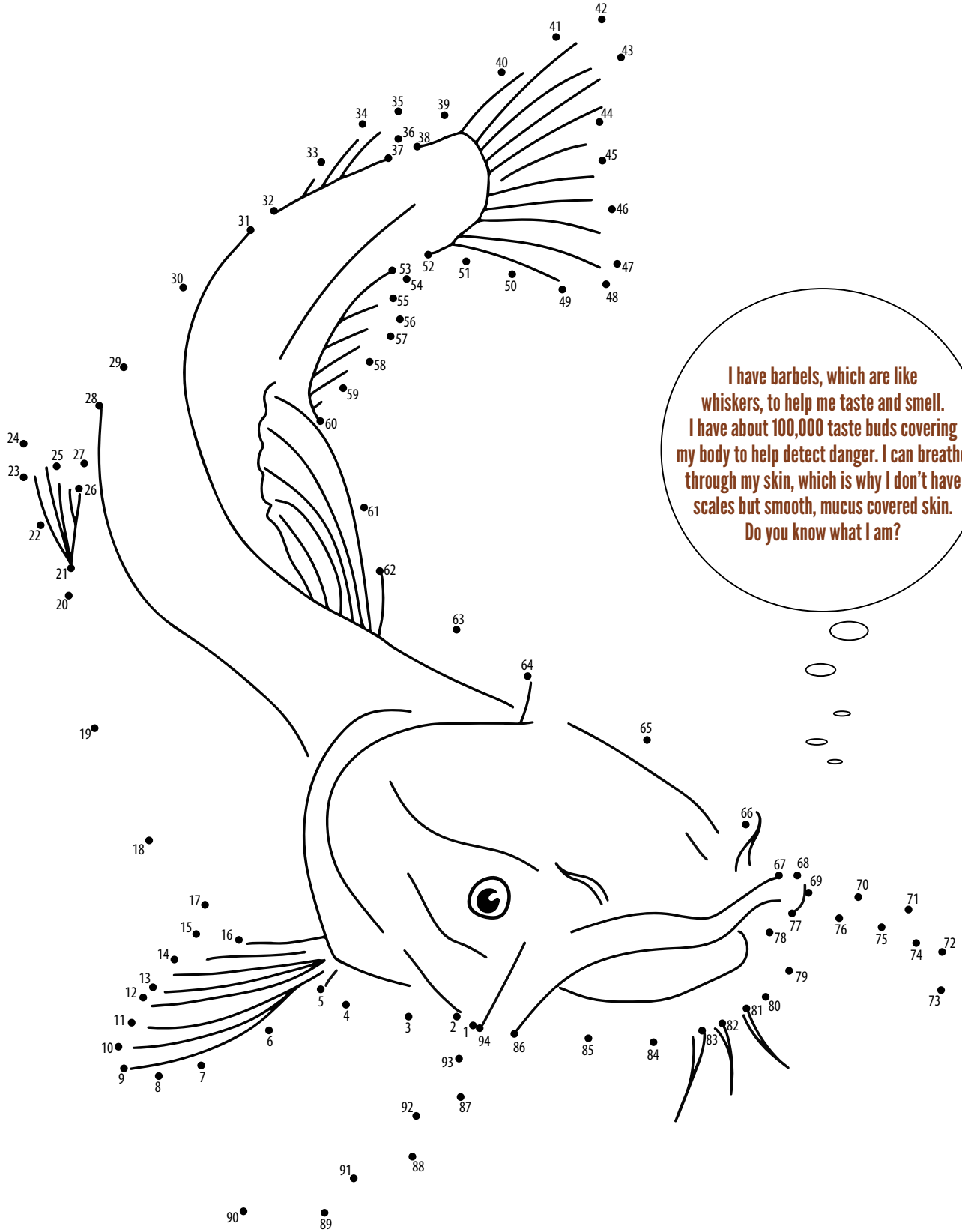
